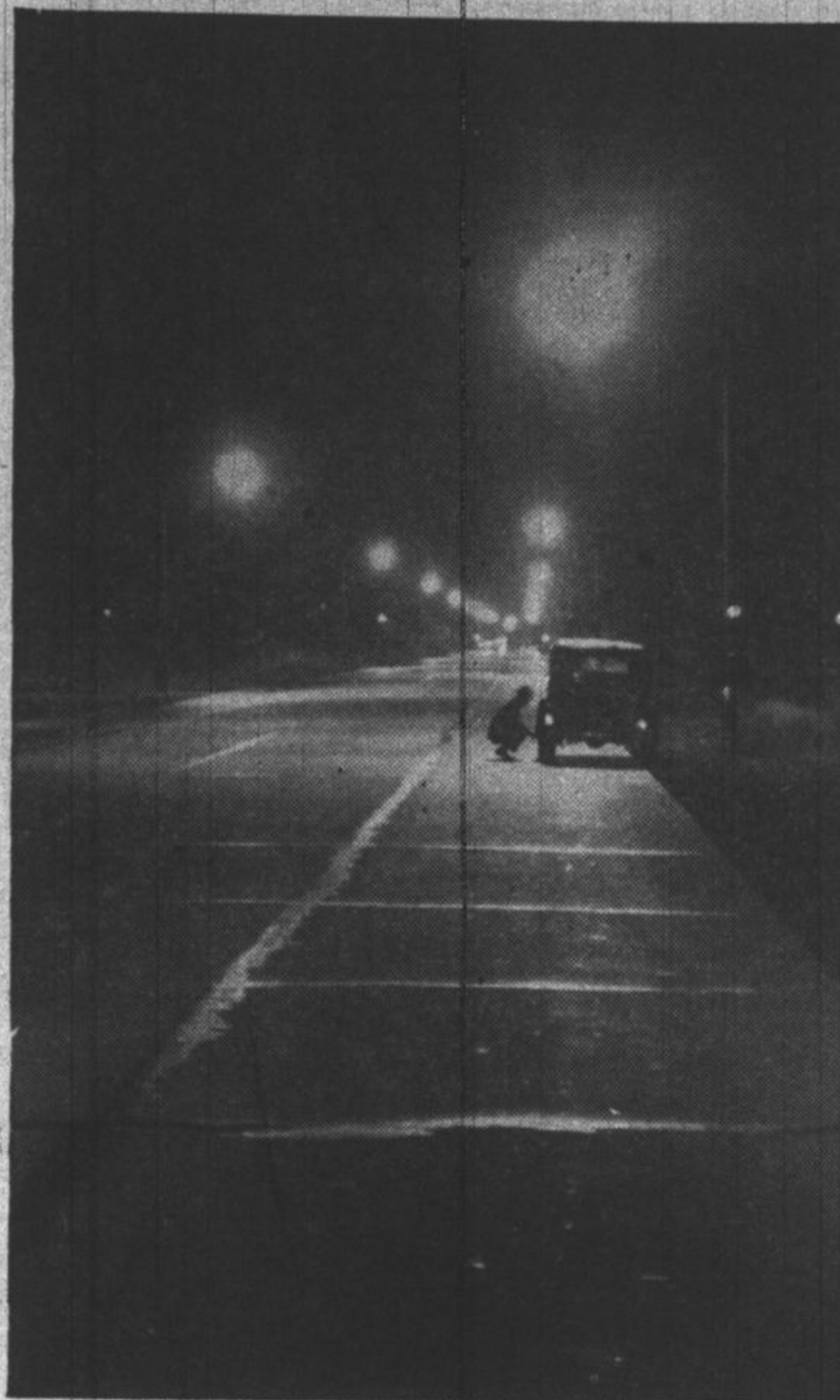


SKOKIE HIGHWAY IS ILLUMINATED
