Back with you again, to give you some first hand information about the Air Show, Oct. 4, that everybody is eagerly awaiting. Sky Harbor is beginning to look like it did back in the boom days, as the exciting day draws nearer.

Captain Art Davis leads a trio that do a loop in close formation at the terrific speed of 300 miles per hour. Smoke pouring from the plant, Capt. Davis has flown in more air races than any other pilot known. Along with Davis, Roger Don Rae will put his Travel air speed wing in many breath taking acts. Don Rae is one of the greatest high speed acrobatic pilots, and America's best parachute jumper. He has 500 parachute jumps to his credit.

Joe Jacobsen, America's No. 1 high speed acrobatic pilot, flies his speedy little Howard Racer. Jacobsen barely escaped death in the recent Bendix transcontinental air race, when his speeding craft exploded over Stafford, Kansas, throwing the daring Ace into flame and debris fill space, before he parachuted safely to earth. He then boarded an air liner to Los Angeles, where he obtained another plane from among the Howard group, and rode to his second spectacular crash several days later, after winning several victories. He again escaped unhurt, and is grooming his third plane for the gruelling races of the Sky Harbor Air Carnival. Jacobsen does all of his acrobatics at very high speeds.

Harold Johnson, whom I have also already spoken of, flies his Ford tri-motor up side down, spins it to 400 feet off the ground, and does loops that will drag the tail skid across the ground upon completing it.

All of these flyers, and many more are coming to Sky Harbor to make it a perfect show, and as we said last week, one of the greatest ever in this part of the country.
