Fire Prevention Week to Be Held Here October 4-10

The proper time to fight a fire is before it starts, states Edward D. Hoskin, fire-marshal of the city of Highland Park.

The loss in life and money, distributed over a period of a year, in the United States alone, reaches an appalling figure. More than 10,000 men, women and children, burn to death annually, and property worth a half million dollars is destroyed in North America.

"Suppose, Mr. Citizen," says Mr. Hoskin, "we see what can be done toward making our city a safe in which to live. Take our record book, for instance, and see what causes these fires in our city. First, we find that matches and smoking compose the greatest hazard. Fifty-one fires were caused by careless smokers.

Non-Resident High School Students Must Pay Tuition

So many non-resident students have come into the Deerfield-Shields Township High School District to attend school while living with relatives or working for board and room, that the board of education has taken steps to reduce the number by requiring tuition in such cases. Such students have often become school problems due to the absence of home guardianship. No new non-resident students are being received into the school except on payment of tuition.

The law regarding the right of free schooling is quoted in the September Educational Press Bulletin issued by the State Superintendent of Public Instruction. It reads as follows:

"Residence and permanent abode are synonymous terms. One cannot have a residence in two places at the same time."

"As a general rule, the residence of parents is the residence of their children. Boarding children in a district does not, of itself, entitle them to the benefits of the free school in said district. The mere temporary residence of a family in a district solely to enjoy the benefits of the free schools and with the intention of removal as soon as that purpose is accomplished, does not entitle the children to the privileges of said schools. The removal of a portion of a family from the legal domicile to another district in order to send to the free schools thereof does not confer the right to do so."

Announce Judges of Election And Polling Places

All Highland Park residents who want to vote at the national election on November 3rd must register in their precinct. However, if you have voted before in that precinct and are registered, it will not be necessary to register again.

Newcomers to Highland Park, or those who have moved since the last election, and all new voters, must register or see that their names are on the poll books in their precinct before the day of election.

The permanent registration law does not apply to Lake County, and registration is not compulsory in our county. Certain days, Tuesday, Oct. 13, and Tuesday, Oct. 27, are set aside for reviewing poll books and putting the names of all voters at the last election on a new register for use in the November election.

It is largely a matter of convenience for new voters or persons who have never voted in their new precincts before, to have their names put on this list on one of the two days, and in that case, the judges (Continued on Page 4)
