

Fire Prevention Week to Be Held Here October 4 - 10

bish. By this I do not only refer to that rubbish outside of the building, but the discarded rubbish that accumulates in cellars and attics. In this class I would place old newspapers, mattresses, pillows, clothes, boxes of inflammable materials that have no value and are useless.

"Now you ask, suppose there is rubbish in the attic or basement, after years of standing, develop cracks from which sparks fly, and any rubbish which may be in the path of the spark is likely to become ignited. Then, too, the sun's rays through windows, have been the cause of many fires as well as open electric wiring in attics. Plus pipes which have rusted out during the summer may send out sparks thru an opening when the fire is lit and thus ignite the rubbish. Sparks from chimneys falling on roof shingles, burn through, and with rubbish in the attic, find a ready spot to spread.

"The next common cause is petroleum and its products. Under this heading comes all inflammable products such as gasoline, oils, grease, cleaning fluids, fuel oil, etc.

"As a large number of homes are heated by oil, it is well to have the plant overhauled and cleaned before starting the operation of the heating apparatus in the fall. This will save the home owner trouble and expense.

"Home dry cleaning is a dangerous practice. Many of the thousands of lives lost by fire can be traced to dry cleaning at home. The danger involved lies in the gas stove pilot light, or the pilot light on your water heater. Certain materials themselves develop static electricity which sparks, causing fires. By all means, if you do your own cleaning, do it in the back yard, or in an open space where there is no danger of an igniting spark.

"Another dangerous practice, is the placing of electric lamp cords in door jams, or where a door will wear a cord. Never run a cord over a radiator or steam pipes, and by no

means under a rug. Do not leave small appliances connected when not in use. Do not disconnect appliances by pulling on the cord. Cords should never be used for permanent and properly installed wiring. Have your work done by electricians who know how to protect your home against these hazards.

"Fire Protection Week" is to be observed next week, October 4 to 10, and every home owner is asked to make this a real inspection week."

Every business house in the city will be inspected by fire department inspectors, during the month of October, and Mr. Hoskin asks that every home owner give his place the same inspection. The time spent will not be wasted and it may be the means of safeguarding your home and family against a disastrous fire.

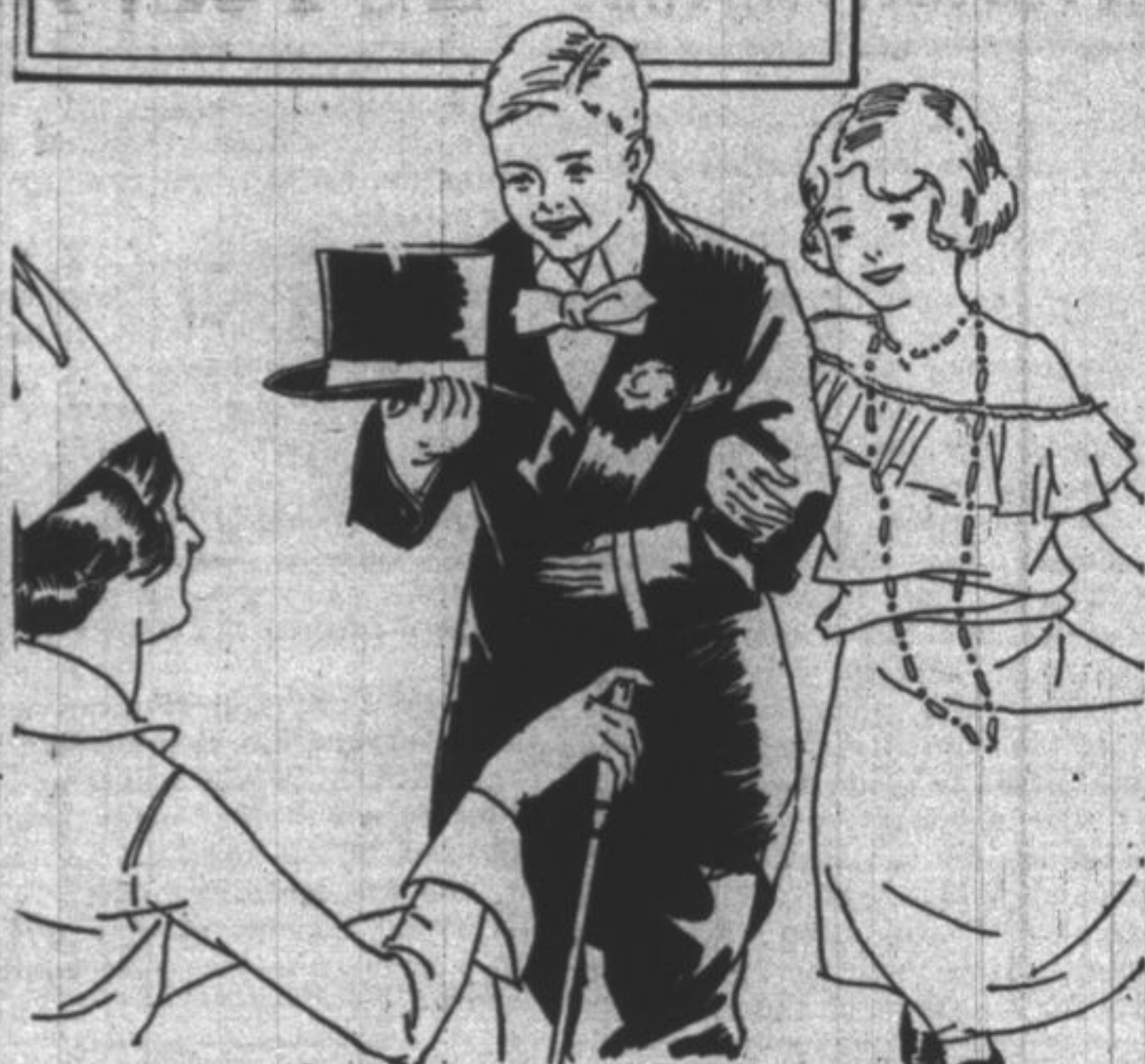
