Chest Pays Last Year's Quota 100% Final Checks Sent

Final payment of the 1935-36 budget quotas of the twelve member agencies of the Highland Park Community Chest was announced today by L. B. Sinclair, assistant treasurer of the Chest.

"Following action of the executive committee of the Chest authorizing payment of the balance due member agencies from the first annual campaign held by the Chest last fall," Mr. Sinclair said, "checks representing the five per cent balance due were mailed yesterday to each of the twelve member agencies asked a year ago."

"We are very happy to announce a one hundred per cent payment of the budgets of the welfare agencies represented by the Chest last year at this time — exactly a month before the close of the fiscal period covered by last year's campaign, and two weeks prior to the start of the second annual Chest campaign on Oct. 15."

"The one hundred per cent payment of last year's Chest budgets at this time marks the complete success of the Chest's first year of operation," said President Cloud E. Wampler, "for which the present officers and board of directors give full credit to all who handled the first campaign and first year of the Chest operations. We especially desire, however, to commend the splendid manner in which the subscribers to the Chest in the first campaign faithfully kept all their pledges and made possible the first year of complete accomplishment of the Chest's objectives. We, who are now actively engaged in organizing for the second annual campaign of the Community Chest, Oct. 15-26, sincerely hope that we may have the same splendid cooperation and wholehearted support from our fellow citizens."

Chairman Herman A. Zischke, reported today that the district system of organizations followed so successfully in last fall's campaign, was being utilized again this year and that within the next few days the organization of the full campaign committee would be completed and made public.

"We are meeting with splendid co-operation in all districts of the city," Mr. Zischke said. "Many who served last year are volunteering to help again. Also we are getting a considerable number of new volunteers."
