

### H. P. High School Defeats Libertyville

Highland Park high school's varsity grid machine left another victim in its wake when they defeated a heavier Libertyville high school eleven 13-0 at the Deerfield-Shields athletic field last Saturday afternoon.

The victory was more impressive than the score would lead you to believe. Highland Park's line functioned brilliantly, many times stopping Libertyville plays before they were started. In the execution of plays the "Little Giants" backfield performed expertly despite the fact that the ground was soft and slippery from a driving rain that continued all afternoon.

Norman Durment, fast stepping substitute halfback, scored both of Highland Park's touchdowns. Late in the first quarter, after his teammates had worked the ball down to the 15 yard line, Durment started off his own left end, reversed his field and cut back to score. Wallie Stunkle pike kicked the point after touchdown.

In the third quarter Bud Baldauf, dynamic 140 pound half back, gave an excellent exhibition of broken field running when he raced through the entire Libertyville squad for 40 yards only to be stopped six inches off the goal line. Durment then took the pass from center and cut thru the center of the Libertyville line for the final marker. Castell's attempt for an extra point from placement failed when the ball hit the cross bar of the uprights.

Highland Park's line displayed the same defensive strength that stopped Crystal Lake in their tracks. The heavy Libertyville team found few weaknesses in the "Little Giants" forward. Wallie Stunkle, Warren Kluk, and Pete Wolfe were again outstanding in the line. Roland Bleimehl and Joe Castelli did a fine job at the ends, getting down under punts before the Libertyville receiver could get under way.

The backfield, playing without the services of Jim Garrity, 175 pound triple-threat fullback, who broke his leg during a scrimmage session last week, functioned in excellent fashion. Sharing the spotlight with Norman Durment and aiding greatly in chalking up Highland Park's second victory were Bud Baldauf and Aldy Harris. Baldauf's ball carrying brought the crowd to their feet more than once while he reeled off long gains for first downs, paving the way for touchdowns. Harris handled the punts in expert style without a fumble, which is quite a feat in that the ball was mighty slippery from the rain and mud.

Libertyville made only one real scoring threat when they recovered a Highland Park fumble on the "Little Giants" 20 yard line. However this was short lived for the scrappy Highland Park eleven soon gained the ball again on downs.

### Real Estate Board to Hear W. L. Bailey at Meeting Oct. 5

An illustrated discourse on "Cities on the Rebound" will feature the next regular monthly meeting of the Evanston-North Shore Real Estate Board at the board rooms, Monday night, October 5, at 8 p.m. The speaker of the evening will be William L. Bailey, professor of urban sociology, School of Sociology, Northwestern university.

"The Hot Spot in the coming boom will be Chicago and the North Shore," according to Professor Bailey and with the aid of stereoptican slides and opaque projections he will trace the rise and growth of U. S. cities. By means of graphs and charts he will outline the coming boom in business and real property and show the fixed relationship between business and real estate cycles in America.

Professor Bailey's illustrated lectures are well known to realtors of metropolitan Chicago and his fame in urban sociological research is nationwide. His visualized European housing trip before the board was the high spot of last year's educational program. His ability to graphically deliver his message is well known to all realtors.
