EDUCATIONAL-RECREATIONAL OPPORTUNITIES IN HIGHLAND PARK EVENING CLASSES AT DEERFIELD-SHIELDS HIGH SCHOOL OPEN TO MEN AND WOMEN OCTOBER 12 - DECEMBER 16

Drawing - Painting

Nicholas Frigo
Drawing from a model or still life, as preferred. Pupils may bring their own materials and work in whatever medium they desire. People who have never drawn before, as well as the more experienced, are encouraged to join this class. Nicholas Frigo is a graduate of the Art Institute and is a young artist of much promise. This is a government class for which there is no charge. Both Monday and Wednesday evenings.

Metal Work

Harry Bolle - Boris Gilbertson
This course includes work in pewter, aluminum and copper, also jewelry making in silver. Instruction is offered in making all kinds of simple bowls and plates, as well as the more complicated pieces which require soldering, riveting, etc. Decoration in the form of etching, repousse work, etc., may be learned. Mr. Bolle is a former pupil of Kronquist in Milwaukee and has done very successful teaching of metal work, both at the high school and at Camp Ma-Ka-Ja-Wan. Mr. Gilbertson is a graduate of the Art Institute and a fine designer and metal worker. Mr. George Carr will assist in Mr. Gilbertson's place the first three weeks.

Pottery

W. A. Gilbertson
Both the beginner and the advanced student will find much to satisfy his creative urge in this class. All kinds of simple bowls, plates, flower vases, pitchers, etc., can be made; and for the more advanced there are many ventures in the field of ceramic sculpture. Mr. Gilbertson, after finishing at the Art Institute, spent three years in New Mexico studying Indian pottery and other crafts. This last summer he did further studying at The School of Ceramic Art in New York.

Woodwork

Robert Schneider - W. E. Durbahn
Almost anything that can be made in wood can be made in this class. The shop is equipped with all kinds of power tools to facilitate work. There has been some demand for instruction in roof framing and a small number might specialize in this, though they would still be part of the general

class. Mr. Schneider and Mr. Durbahn are both excellently equipped to teach and have been instructors at Deerfield-Shields for many years. For those who feel unable to cope with power tools and for those who want elementary instructions there will be a class at Lincoln school with Mr. Borg on Tuesday evenings. (See notice below).

Child Study

Lettie Johnston - Wanda Greineisen
Miss Johnston and Miss Greineisen have been co-directors of the Village and Farm schools in Glenwood and Northbrook for twelve years. In addition to these years of practical experience with children they have done a great deal of study and research work on the psychological factors in education. The course will include discussion of various aspects of child study: the meaning of growth, physical, social and mental from childhood to adulthood; children in their relation to members of their family, temperament, rebellion, jealousy, attitudes toward brothers and sisters; children in their relation to their playmates, aggressiveness, shyness, cruelty, quarreling; parents and their relation to their children, attitudes toward behavior, habits, discipline, the spoiled child and the neglected child; what education owes to the child. From the practical standpoint discussion of what materials to provide for a child's physical needs, what occupations to teach for their mental needs, what opportunities to offer for their social needs. Finally, in what ways the family can share the child's life and what the family can do to contribute towards a child's education.

Public Speaking

Many people feel strongly the need of acquiring more confidence in speaking before groups. This course will be a well rounded training in the various factors that go into the making of a good speaker. Several excellent men at Northwestern U. are at present being considered to teach this class, and a choice will very shortly be made.

English Usage

Regina Beckmire
A course in the use of correct English, with instruction in the writing of business letters, etc. Miss Beckmire is a teacher at Deerfield-Shields; she has been most successful in making this a really interesting and stimulating subject.

TRACEY STREVEY.
Those who listened to Prof. Strevey last year will be glad to welcome him back. He is Professor of American History at Northwestern University, and has a great deal of understanding of our present American problems. His keen analysis and detached point of view make him a most interesting speaker.

S. STANISFELD SARGENT.
Mr. Sargent has had a broad experience as teacher and lecturer in the field of Political Science and Psychology. He was graduated with honors in 1927 from Haverford College, and pursued post graduate work at the University of Pennsylvania and Columbia. He was instructor of Psychology at Adelphi College and special lecturer and discussion group leader for the Des Moines Public Forums, he emphasizes in his talks not so much the political events as the national and local psychologies which underlie them, and the varied types of propaganda which turn citizens into puppets.

FRANKLIN D. SCOTT.
Mr. Scott is in the modern History department at Northwestern University. He has a doctor's degree from Harvard University and is well equipped to understand contemporary history. He has spent recently a year and a half in Sweden and several months each in Germany, France, Austria, and England for the purpose of research and travel.

RALPH McCALLISTER
Mr. McCallister is at present the new director of the Adult Education Council in Chicago. He was formerly director of Social Studies in the Public Schools in Dearborn, Michigan, and director of the Dearborn Community Forum for three years.
