For the next three months, the home will be open to the public. It is designed, equipped and furnished to inspire home-builders.  
Its sponsors and the cooperating agencies which joined with the Federal Housing Administration to build the new home, have kept foremost the idea that the home will serve as an inspiration for thousands of home-builders in all sections of the city.

Throughout the home, there is an opportunity for home lovers to obtain ideas for their own dwellings. The six rooms and two baths of the new home are equipped and furnished with the latest products of American manufacturers. These include an all-electric kitchen, electric laundry, unique utility room, ultra-modern bathroom fixtures, and new radial wiring.  
Color schemes in the various rooms are distinct and modern, and are carried out in walls, floors and furnishings.

Striking indication of the interest evidenced in Chicago in the building of new homes was shown in the throngs of visitors who inspected the home the last few days, according to Stayvrest Peabody, chairman of the New American Home committee.  
"From the day of its opening the home has proved an inspiration to many persons," Mr. Peabody said.  
"To those without homes, the new modern home has more firmly imbedded in them a desire to one day own a home of their own. To those building homes the many features of the modern home make for an instant appeal.  
"Agencies which cooperated in the building of the home have as their business keeping pace with the latest trends in all phases of home construction," continued Mr. Peabody, "as well as equipping the furnishing homes. Thus, we are able to present in the New American Home the very latest of all home features."
