One of the largest and most beautiful weddings of the autumn season, took place Saturday evening at eight-thirty o'clock in the Highland Park Presbyterian church, when Dorothy Bard, daughter of the Francis Norwood Bards, and Joshua D. A raised platform was built in front of the altar, so that the service was seen by the entire assemblage. The church decorations consisted of a double hedge of huckleberry, used as a background for the large wedding party, and tall standards filled with white chrysanthemums.

Miss Bard was given in marriage by her father. She was attired in a gown of ivory satin with long sleeves, a high neck, and a circular train. A wreath of tiny white calla lilies circled her dark hair and her bridal veil was of tulle. She carried a shower bouquet of white orchids and valley lilies.

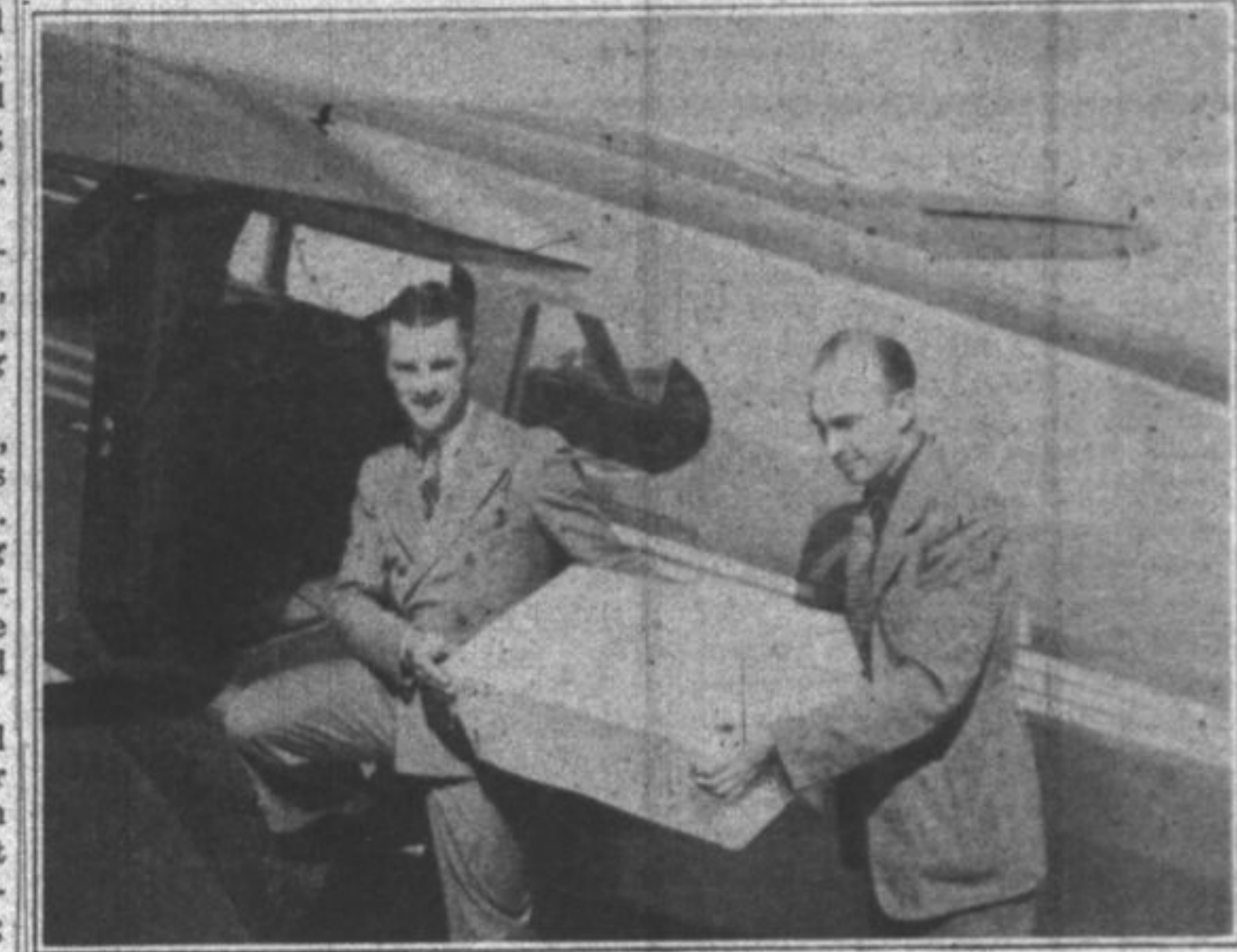
