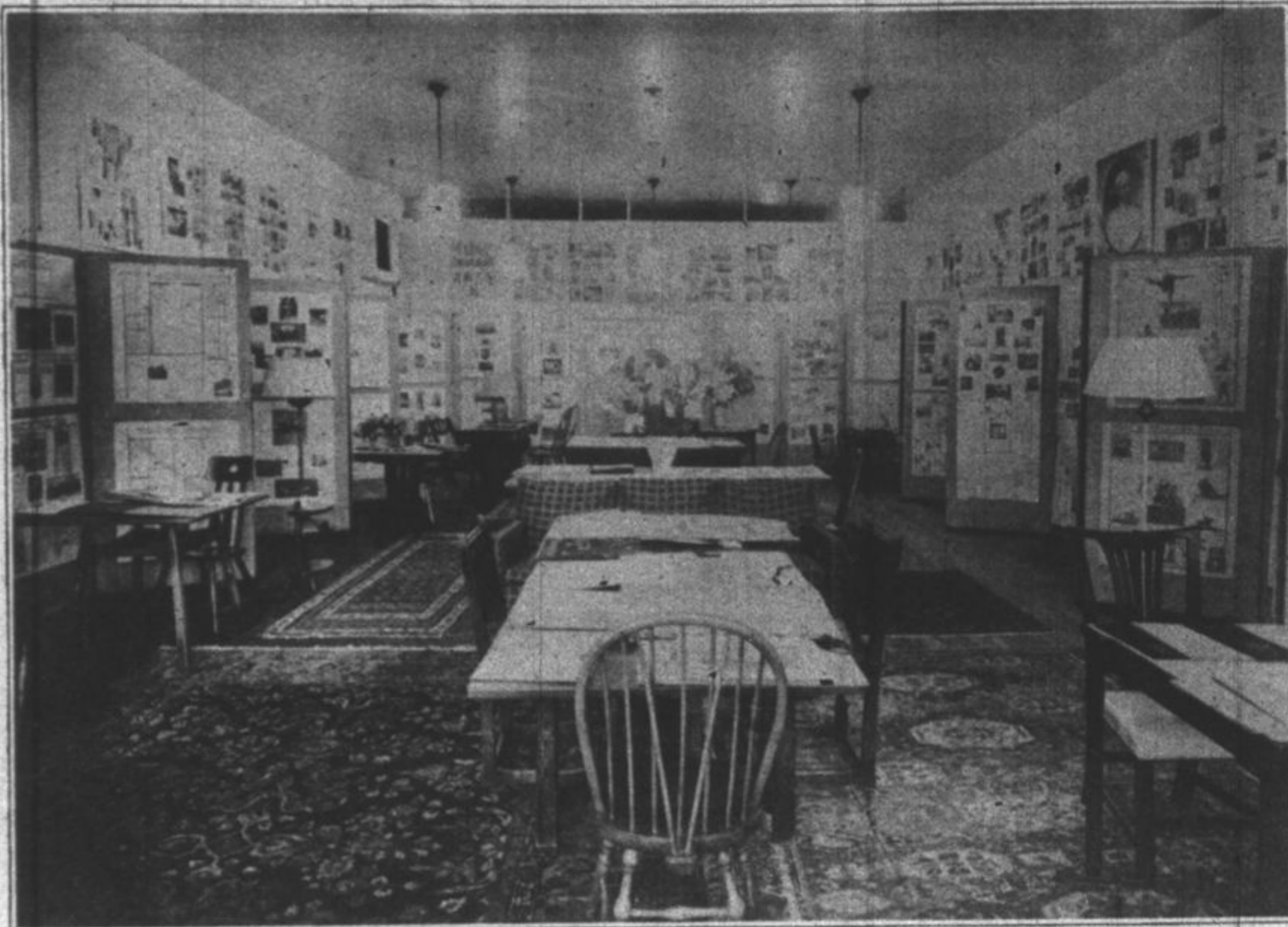


Display of "The Christian Science Monitor" Attracts Attention
