

Mighty Huskies Crush Local H. S. Grid Team 52-0

A pall of gloom fell over Highland Park high school's football headquarters late last Saturday afternoon after the mighty "Huskies" from Oak Park had passed, plunged and raced their way to a crushing 52-0 victory in the opening Suburban league encounter at the Deerfield-Shields athletic field.

Highland Park entered the game with a record of two games to their credit and without a score against them. Oak Park on the other hand had been defeated twice and had won one game.

From the opening kickoff, when Highland Park received the ball, only to lose it on downs after a very short scrimmage, Oak Park went on a scoring spree. They scored 13 points in the first quarter, seven in the second, 13 more in the third, and then the "Shock Troops" added 19 more in the final period.

Oak Park presented a machine like attack that worked to perfection. Their hard blocking and powerful driving power had Highland Park on the defensive all afternoon. Not once did they falter, working cautiously and effectively, making each movement count for extra yardage.

Highland Park's backs had very little opportunity to show their speed inasmuch as their visitors had the ball most of the afternoon.

Even in defeat, however, several Highland Park warriors added a spark of light to their chances in future games. In the line only one player stood out above the others. Warren Klug, guard, played brilliantly and was labeled by the Oak Park coach as a possible All-Suburban prospect.

the opposition. In the backfield where most of the tackles were made, we noted the work of Aldie Harris and Bud Baldauf with considerable interest.

On punts, both in receiving and getting them off, Harris was by far the best man on the field. Harris punted on an average of 40 yards on every attempt and that's punting against a team such as Oak Park's. Bud Baldauf made the only long runs for Highland Park, making several brilliant attempts for extra yardage.

Although the team showed little of the strength they had against Libertyville and Crystal Lake, we still believe they have a chance to show their ability before the season is over. They meet the Evanston Wildcats next Saturday at Beardley field, Evanston, and, should the effect of the Oak Park game wear off, one should see a better contest, with the Highland Park boys offering considerable more opposition.

A series of disastrous fumbles in the first quarter led to the downfall of Coach Lauer's Sophomores in their game with the Oak Park crew Saturday. Larry Parsons, ordinarily a sure ball handler, fumbled on the third play of the game, Oak Park recovered and in two plays scored a touchdown.

Offensively, Highland Park looked best in the last quarter when Neil Lorimer recovered an Oak Park fumble and a triple pass, Mason to Lorimer to Clark, made a good 15 yards. Warmbold and Sellegren starred for Oak Park while Lorimer, Juhrend, Mason, Wing, and Dean looked best for the Lauer boys.

The Twenty-second annual convention of the Girl Scouts will open in Cincinnati October 14, when hundreds of delegates from every state in the Union will assemble to discuss the policies and plans of the National Council. Several Highland Park and other North Shore women are planning to attend.

Mrs. Roscoe B. Crabbs, commissioner of the Cincinnati Council, will welcome the visitors, on whose behalf Mrs. Herbert Hoover, national president, will reply. Familiarize Voters With Glackin Law The various civic clubs, Parent-Teacher Associations, and woman's clubs over Lake county are being contacted during the next two weeks by speakers sent out from the Lake County Tuberculosis Association to familiarize the members with the provisions of the Sanatorium Law which will be voted on at the general election in November.

The Sanatorium or Glackin Law, as it is known, is a law of the State of Illinois which empowers the county board of each county to establish and maintain a county Tuberculosis Sanatorium, or to pay for the care of tuberculosis persons in a sanatorium elsewhere in the state, by levying a tax not to exceed one and one-half mills. This law applies only to tuberculosis and cannot be misconstrued to include hospitals or other institutions wherein any other type of disease may be treated. The inadequate number of beds for tuberculosis patients in Lake County makes it imperative that some additional provision be made for them. Dr. J. A. Ross, of Wauconda, Drs. Mosquito Trustees Will Meet October 13th

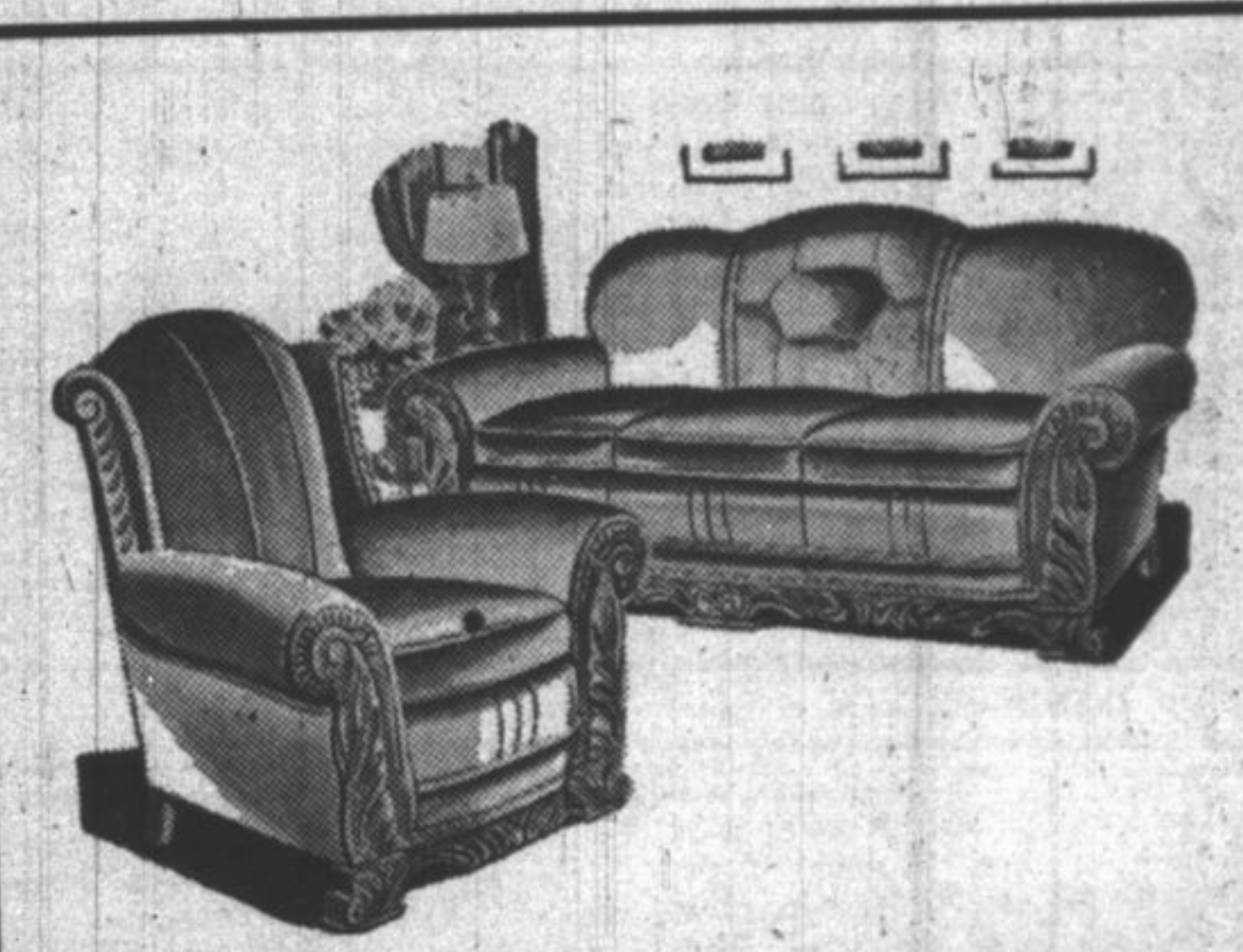
