**Sunday Schools of County Convene at Mundelein, October 20**

The First Congregational church at Mundelein will be host to the sixty-sixth annual convention of Lake County Sunday School workers, on Tuesday, October 20. This interdenominational meeting will be called to order at 9:30 o'clock, by Rev. A. Melvin Tinker, of Highland Park, the president of the organization. Delegates from the various church and communities in the county are expected to fill the Mundelein church.

Rev. F. G. Piepenbrok, of St. Paul's Evangelical church, Deerfield, will lead the morning and afternoon devotional service, and Rev. C. Arthur Jevne, pastor of the entertaining church, will extend greetings to the visitors. Rev. Mr. Tinker will respond, giving a brief preview of the day's program. The principal feature of the morning session will be a series of discussions on "Teaching Missions," led by Miss Faith Bushnell, of Waukegan; "Worship and Music" led by Rev. Mr. Piepenbrok, and "Recreational Activities," led by George Scheuchpflug, the director of the community playground at Highland Park.

The convention address will be delivered in the afternoon by Dr. Norman E. Richardson, professor of religious education at the Presbyterian Theological Seminary, Chicago. Dr. Richardson is well known nationally as a writer and lecturer on subjects dealing with the spiritual training and education of childhood and youth. His topic on this occasion will be "Christianity and Present Day Environment." This address will be followed by three age-group discussions. Miss E. Mae Young, of the Methodist Episcopal Board, Chicago, will lead the teachers of children. Miss Mary Leigh Palmer, head of the Department of Religious Education at the Presbyterian College of Christian Education, Chicago, will speak to the Young Peoples workers, and delegates interested in adult education will be led in their thinking by three Lake County adult class workers—Mrs. Chester A. Wolf, teacher of the women's class in the Deerfield Presbyterian Church School, Mrs. H. J. Hagerty, of the Libertyville Methodist Church, and

Harry E. White, adult Bible class teacher in the Mundelein Congregational Church.

Rev. H. F. Siemsen, pastor of the Bethany Evangelical Church, Highland Park, will close the afternoon session with a brief inspirational talk, looking forward to greater efforts in the year to come.

The evening program will be in charge of the county Young Peoples' committee.
