Fio Ritos Sued by Bannockburn Man

Ted Fio-Rito, famous orchestra leader, and Mrs. Ted Fio-Rito are named defendants in a suit for \$1,500 in county court by Richard W. Farmer of Bannockburn for alleged damages to a farm on Telegraph rd., Bannockburn, which the Fio-Ritos had leased for the summer.

The Fio-Ritos consumed 40 leg-horn chickens from the farm from June 24 to Sept. 24, and a bay saddle horse was missing from the farm, the complaint filed by Gail & Behanna charged. Under the lease

which the Fio-Ritos had signed with Farmer, the farm and its contents were to be returned at the expiration of the lease in the same condition as when the Fio-Ritos moved in on June 24.

When the Fio-Ritos signed the lease they paid \$100 and \$1,100 was paid for the period from June 24 to Sept. 24.

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
