The Lake County Commission of Public Welfare has considered 1,160 applications since it began work in April, 1936, and of that number 701 have been approved and sent to Springfield, the balance having been lost through disapprovals, withdrawals, death and cases deferred for various reasons. The average state award per person in Lake County is \$14.22.

At the present time the investigators are working on 257 cases that are awaiting proof of various kinds. The commission has been working since April, 1936, and is diligently pushing the work to its completion.
