Teams To Carry Manufacturer's Brand Names This Season
Due to the fact that only ten teams can compete in the league's tournament this season limited because of only ten alleys being available at Bleser's Bowling academy, four Centrella store owners were forced to withdraw their teams. Local Library Gets \$1220.00 from County Library Relief Fund

Public libraries of Lake County have received \$7,517 to replenish their book shelves during the past year from library relief funds appropriated through the efforts and administered by Secretary of State Edward J. Hughes, it was announced today.

The individual libraries that received assistance and the amount paid each are as follows: Waukegan, \$3,349.90; Antioch, \$110.10; Lake Bluff, \$145.20; Highland Park, \$1,220.30; Deerfield, \$308.40; Barrington, \$321.30; Lake Forest, \$655.40; Libertyville, \$559.80; North Chicago, \$846.60.

The 59th general assembly created the fund for relief of all free tax-supported libraries within the state. As Secretary of State, Mr. Hughes, who also is state librarian, was designated by the legislature to allocate the fund among the various libraries.

With the aid and counsel of the Illinois Library association, allocations were made for the purchase of books by libraries on a basis of five cents per capita.

This fund permitted purchase of reference books on technical and business subjects, replacements, old and new books for children, recently published books on a variety of subjects, magazine and newspaper subscriptions.

"Many of these libraries were sorely in need of new books," said Secretary Hughes. "I believe the money expended by the state was well invested and the dividends to

our citizens will be multiplied many times." There are 278 free tax-supported libraries in Illinois.

Ravinia P.M. Asks Public's Co-operation For Better Service

The following letter from the Ravinia postmaster, James Thomson, offers a service to the public and asks for their co-operation to improve service to his patrons.

"It is quite apparent to the people of Highland Park that the Ravinia Post Office is entirely independent of the Highland Park office. Many letters are received by the patrons of the Ravinia Post Office that bear only two cents in postage, and as the Postal Regulations require three cents postage on all first class mail between two separate post offices this necessitates either charging the addressee with an additional one cent, or returning the letter to the sender for additional payment of postage when refused by the addressee. This creates a delay in the mail, an additional expense to the government in the handling of this under-paid mail, and a great deal of inconvenience and annoyance to patrons.

"The greatest difficulty lies in the fact that all people living in Ravinia are not patrons of the Ravinia Post Office. Those residents receiving mail by carrier are served by the Highland Park office, and only those who are not located so that they may get carrier service, or those who prefer to have their mail sent to a box at Ravinia, are served by the Ravinia Post Office.

"Postal regulation prohibits the divulging the names of box holders, but the Ravinia Post Office, has from time to time, volunteered to separate the Ravinia mail from the Highland Park mail for different business institutions.

"The Ravinia Post Office is always ready and willing to perform this service for everyone, whether a business institution or an individual."

Roller Skating Rink Open to Public Oct. 16

The commanding officer of the Naval Training Station, Great Lakes, announces that the roller skating rink in the drill hall at the station will be open to the public at seven-thirty on Friday evening, Oct. 16. Thereafter the rink will be available to skaters on Tuesday and Friday evenings from seven-thirty until ten-thirty. Admission charges for adults and children under 14 years of age will be nominal. The children will be required to clear the floor at 9 o'clock each evening. The proceeds from the skating will go to the Ninth Naval District auxiliary of the Navy Relief society.
