

Deerfield Loses to Evanston in Last Quarter; Score 13-0

Warner Turriff A very much underrated Highland Park high school football team gave the Evanston high school Wildkats a real scare at Beardsley field last Saturday afternoon when they held their heavier opponents to a scoreless tie for three quarters, only to tie in the final period and lose 13-0.

Coach Heinie Schultz, who had before the game labeled the "Little Giants" the weakest team in the league, must have felt rather embarrassed when his second string lineup had to be relieved early in the first quarter. Highland Park in possession of the ball on Evanston's 20-yard line, lost the ball on downs with the entrance of the Wildkat regulars, but not before they had made a gallant attempt to score.

The first score of the game came early in the final period when Lloyd Jewett, stocky Evanston full back, hit the line three successive times to advance the ball from the 20 yard line over the goal. An attempted plunge for the extra point was unsuccessful. Evanston scored again, after Highland Park fumbled a kickoff, giving the Wildkats possession of the ball on their own 25 yard line. Jewett again rushed the Highland Park line, placing the ball on the 1-yard line where Worthington went through right tackle for the final score. Miedzianowski then kicked for the extra point which was successful.

Highland Park made several scoring threats during the game. In the first quarter Stunkle blocked an Evanston punt and Engels recovered on the 40-yard line. Several plunges and sweeping end runs by Scott and Baldauf, and a pass, Harris to Bleimehl, placed the ball on the 10 yard line, but the Evanston line held and the "Little Giants" lost the ball on downs. Again in the last quarter Highland Park threatened. A 25-yard return of the Evanston kickoff, and two passes, Harris to Benson, and Durmont to Bleimehl, brought the ball to Evanston's 20-yard line, but

a fumble proved disastrous and a chance to score was lost. An overconfident Evanston squad met in Highland Park a considerably stronger foe than they had expected. The "Little Giants" line charged hard, stopping the Wildkats time and again. It was Evanston's heavier backs that made the real difference, although Highland Park showed much improvement over last week. Aldie Harris saved the day more than once with his long, accurate punts, that kept the "Little Giants" out of danger. The whole line deserves a lot of credit for their play in this game. Perhaps next year Coach Schultz won't be so fast in judging Highland Park a "pushover."

Next Saturday the improved "Little Giants" machine travels to Morton where they should chalk up their first league victory. Morton hasn't won a game as yet and should be a good match for Coach Floyd's team.
