wooden basket, which was set against a wooden partition, started a fire in the home of Arnold Peterson, 1291 Broadview ave. Damage amounted to about three hundred dollars and was covered by insurance. An oil burner explosion at the A. S. Hart home, 1718 S. Sheridan rd., at 7:30 Sunday evening, caused a slight loss, damage being mostly from smoke. The local fire department responded promptly to all three calls. Chief Edward Hoskins was feeling greatly elated over the fact that fire prevention week was being observed here, during the week of Oct. 4-10, without a fire, but the fire Sunday evening broke the record.

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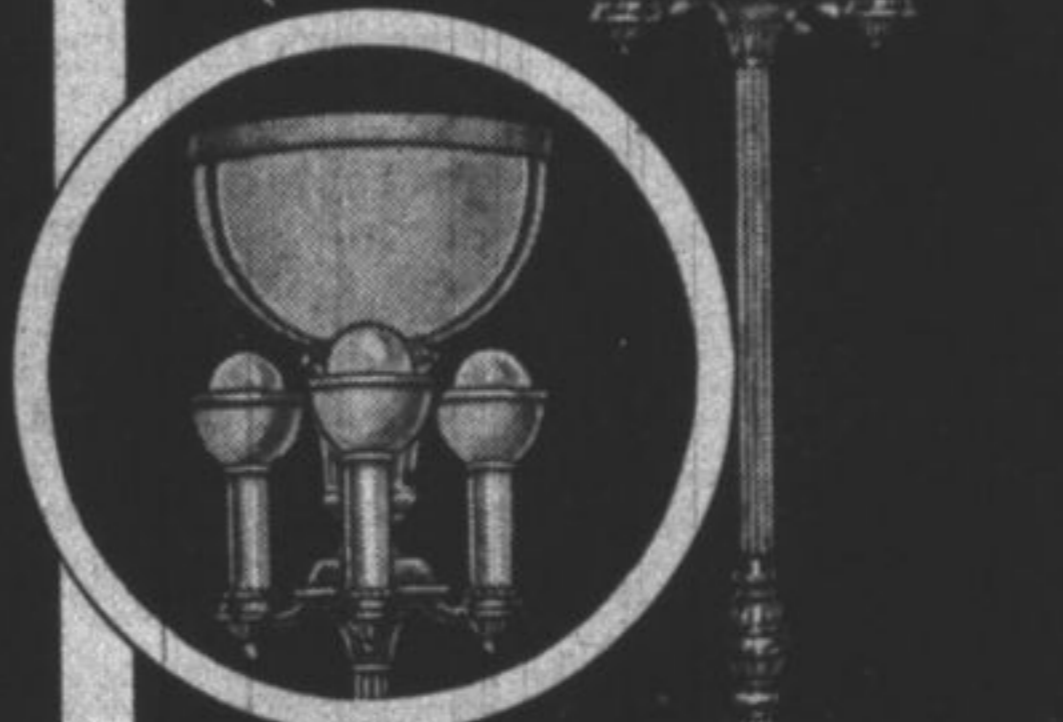
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
