**Dorothy Guilliams Wins Scholarship**

Miss Dorothy Guilliams, of the Highland Park high school won a full-tuition scholarship in English on Saturday in the 8th annual high school day examinations at Oberlin College. Miss Guilliams was one of 300 who took the college and conservatory examinations Saturday. Her scholarship is valued at \$250.

Nearly a thousand students, parents and high school teachers were in Oberlin for the high school day program. Ten states were represented: Ohio, New York, Maryland, West Virginia, Illinois, Pennsylvania, Michigan, Indiana, New Jersey, and Missouri, as well as the District of Columbia.

The Cleveland Heights high school and Glenville high school were highest on the list of honor certificate winners judged after the exams in the college and conservatory. Each school had eight students each receiving honors. Oak Park and River Forest township high school, was next with six.

**Old Age Assistance In Lake County**

At the weekly meeting of the Lake County commission of public welfare held in the court house on Monday evening, Supt. Funk made a report on the present situation in Lake County: 1363 cases have been acted upon to date leaving a total of 20 which have not yet come before the commission. Of this number 184 have been contacted by the investigators and are at present awaiting final proof that is required by the state authorities for residence, citizenship and age. Twenty five of the cases have not yet been contacted. It is reported that investigators would complete their visits by Nov. 1.

To date 753 cases have been approved by the Lake county commission and sent to Springfield; 178 have been disapproved, 269 withdrawn, 76 deferred for various reasons, 58 deceased, and 29 have moved away. To date 509 have been approved by Springfield.

**Frosh-Soph Team Loses to New Trier**
