CHRISTIAN SCIENCE CHURCHES
"Probation After Death" was the subject of the Lesson-Sermon in all Churches of Christ, Scientist, on Sunday, October 25.
The Golden Text was, "The righteous also shall hold on his way, and he that hath clean hands shall be stronger and stronger" (Job 17:9).
Among the citations which comprised the Lesson-Sermon was the following from the Bible: "Behold the eye of the Lord is upon them that fear him, upon them that hope in his mercy: To deliver their soul from death, and to keep them alive in famine. Our soul waiteth for the Lord, he is our help and our shield" (Psalms 31:18-20).
The Lesson-Sermon also included the following passages from the Christian Science textbook "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures" by Mary Baker Eddy: "Understanding little about the divine Principle which saves and heals, mortals get rid of sin, sickness, and death only in belief. These errors are not thus really destroyed and must therefore cling to mortal until, here or hereafter, they gain the true understanding of God in the Science which destroys human delusions about Him and reveals the grand realities of His almightiness" (p. 828).
