

New Trier Defeats H. P. High School in Homecoming Game

Before a large and colorful home coming crowd, Coach Dan Floyd's Highland Park eleven lost a close battle to New Trier in their annual clash last Saturday. The final score was 13-7. The weather was ideal and the field was in almost perfect shape. The game was full of thrills including long runs, injured referees, intercepted passes, 60 yard punts, razzle dazzel passing, and fumbles kept the crowd in suspense until the last man was dragged off the ball.

New Trier's first score came in the initial quarter when after consistent gains by Clayton and Gray, the latter ran the remaining six yards and kicked goal. They scored again in the second quarter after Harris' fumble on the 35 yard line gave New Trier the ball in Highland Park territory. MacFadzean, in for Clayton, ran the final 15 yards for the touchdown, tho he was forced to make two plays of it when run out of bounds on the 1-yard line.

As the second half opened, Engels and Bleimehl shared honors in recovering a fumble on the New Trier 40-yard line. Baldauf made four yards and Tom Ullman refused to be stopped at the line of scrimmage, plowed through the secondary and ran 36 yards straight to the goal line. Stuenkel made his goal good.

Highland Park stock went sky high when, almost immediately after their first touchdown, long runs by Wilder, Harris, and Durment and a 15 yard pass from Harris to Bleimehl took the ball to the 5-yard line. first down and goal to go. However, their chances went waning with 2 unsuccessful end runs and two incomplete passes.

Buddy Baldauf gave the crowd a thrill in the second quarter when he ran 50 yards from the New Trier 30 to his own 20-yard line. In attempting to sidestep the safety man he allowed another New Trier back to nail him. Harris fumbled when tackled hard on the next play and New Trier recovered.

The two teams were tied on first downs 6 to 6, though Highland Park gained considerably more yardage. Fumbles and bad breaks prevented Floyd's boys from scoring the victory their drive and spirit deserved.

In addition to the good work of the backfield, the Highland Park line played fine ball. Bleimehl, Stuenkel, and Wolff played great game. Wolff broke through from center a

As a child of 4 Mrs. Mandel came to Chicago with her parents, the Emmanuel Franks, and ten other children from Germany, after a stormy thirty day crossing of the Atlantic ocean in a sailing vessel. Six months before the great fire of 1871 she married Mr. Mandel.

Still active and alert Mrs. Mandel maintains a keen interest in world events as well as her many philanthropies. She is a niece of the late Michael Reese, who endowed the hospital of that name. Mrs. Mandel established the Babetta and Emanuel Mandel free clinic here.

Mrs. Mandel lives with her only surviving child, Edwin F., president of the department store. She has three grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.

Members of the Highland Park League of Women Voters will be on hand on Saturday, Oct. 31 in front of Walgreen's Drug store in Highland Park and Geell's Drug store in Ravinia to give out sample ballots and any information citizens may desire on the coming elections.
