The Deerfield Village Board will meet Tuesday evening, Nov. 10, at the Masonic temple.

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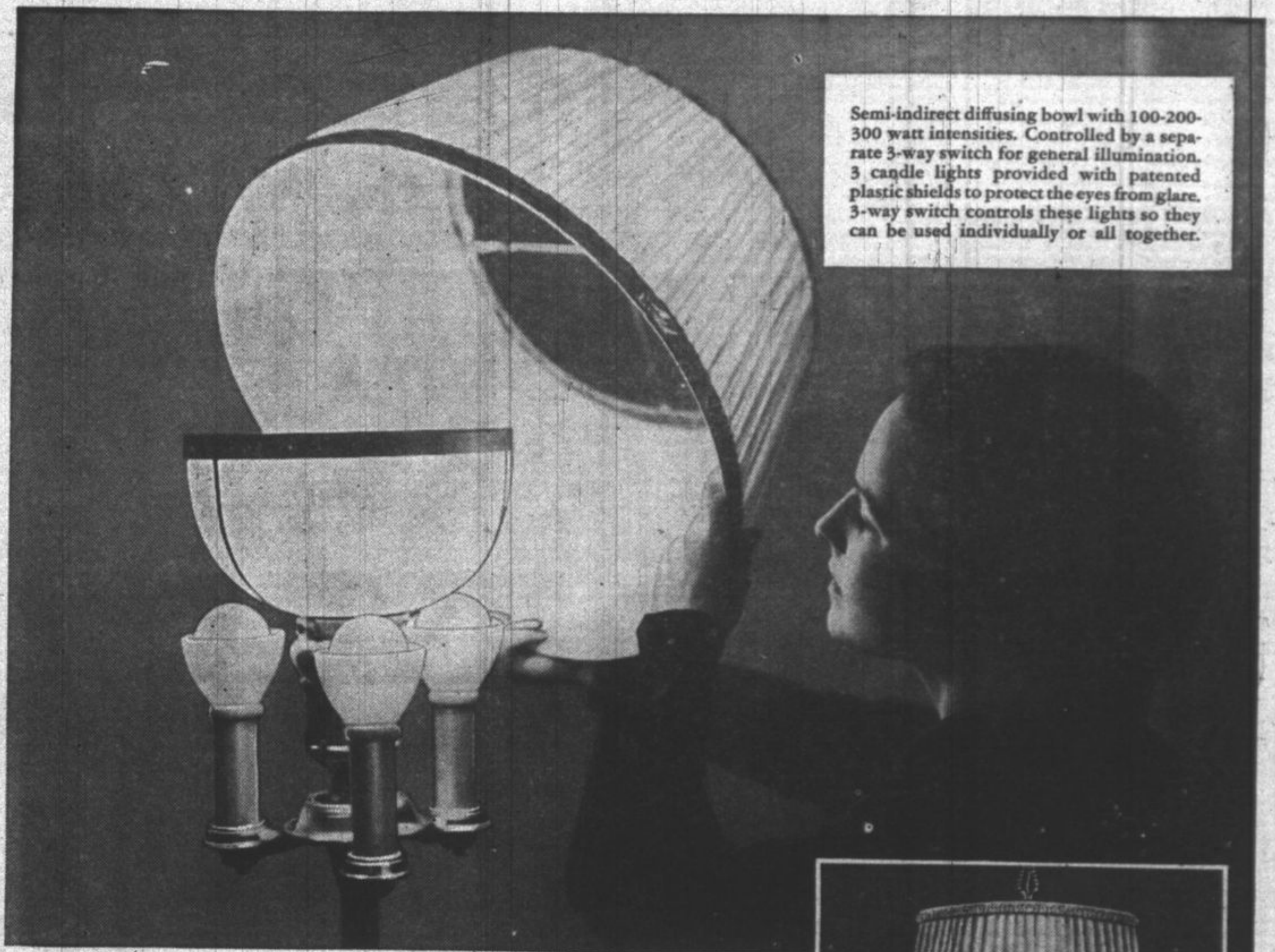
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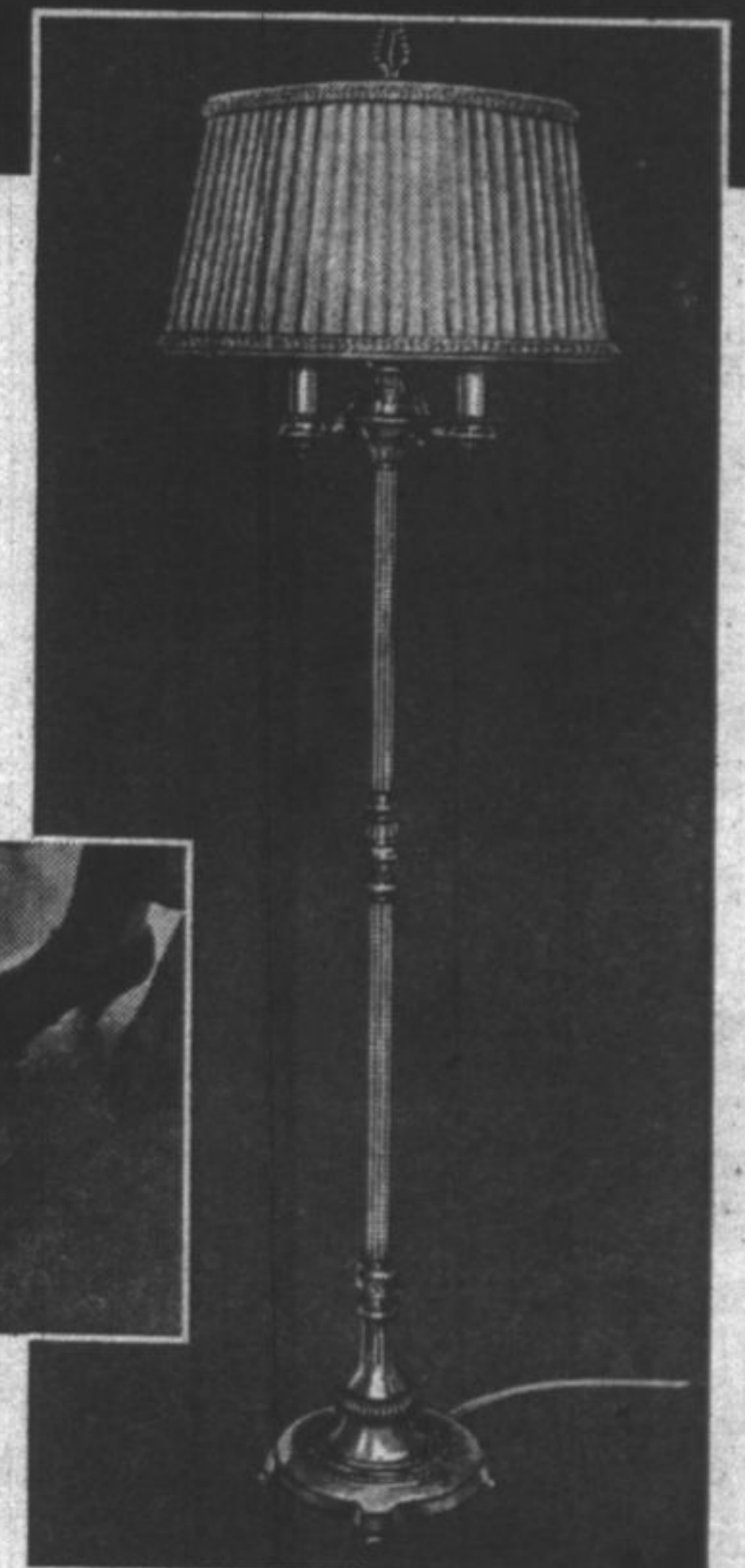
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
