## Chief Tiffany Of Lake Forest Will Address H.P. Lions

Mr. Frank Tiffany, chief of police of Lake Forest, will address the Highland Park Lions' club at its regular Thursday luncheon, November 12, to be held at the Green Tea Pot.

Chief Tiffany has chosen as his subject "The Modern Police Patrol System," and will narrate some of the interesting and exciting calls which have come over the highly efficient inter-communicating radio system which is installed on the Lake Forest police cars. Since the installation of these radios three years ago, they have never lost a call, which certainly establishes their worth.

With this radio system, it is possible for headquarters to call the patrolling car, and vice versa, and it is also possible for one car to call another, thereby insuring a rapid and effective method of pursuing and capturing law-breakers and criminals.

Because of his many years of experience in the business of keeping law and order, Chief Tiffany is especially qualified to speak on this subject. He enjoyed ten years of commendable service as chief of police of the city of North Chicago, and for the past six years Mr. Tiffany has been chief of the Lake Forest police department. His faithful performance in connection with his duties on the police force has won the admiration and praise of many citizens on the North Shore and outlying towns, as well.

The Lions club is honored to be addressed by such a worthy speaker and a full attendance is expected. The program is being sponsored by Lion Cyril Duffy.

## Fire Department to Again Play Santa at Christmas Time

As has been their custom for the past several years the members of the Highland Park Fire Department are reclaiming old toys to be distributed among the needy children of our city on Christmas. Many of these children would not receive toys on Christmas if the men of the department did not look after them. Last year the department supplied toys to over 275 children.

This undertaking is made possible by donations of paints, brushes, nails, screws and bolts by our local merchants. All dolls are repaired by the Social Service and dressed by women workers employed by the Social Service. The members of the Fire Department repair and paint the toys and store them away ready for delivery on Christmas eve.

The ladies of the Social Service work for days in advance of Christmas making a complete list of children as to age and whether boy or girl.

The firemen pack and deliver the toys. Any one who has old toys that have outlived their usefulness and wish to give to the needy are requested to deliver them to the Fire stations either Ravinia or Highland Park Central Station. The firemen would like to have the toys as soon as possible. The more time they can spend on a toy the better it will look to the child on Christmas day.

## Don't Forget to Turn Back Your Clocks

Central Standard time will be resumed in Highland Park, Sunday morning. When you retire Saturday night turn your clocks back, and go to sleep, knowing that for one day at least, you may get an extra hour of sleep.

Highland Park is following the decision made by Chicago voters at the election last Tuesday, to adopt the combination system of standard time in the winter and daylight savings time in the summer from the last Sunday in April to the last Sunday in September. Suburban towns are bound so closely to Chicago, that they are governed by Chicago's decision in this matter, and so will return to Standard Time.

Schedules of train time on the Chicago Northwestern R.R. and the Chicago North Shore & Milwaukee R.R. will be adjusted accordingly. Don't forget to turn your clocks back an hour Sunday.

## Women Voters Will Hear Authority on Social Questions

Miss Grace E. Benjamin, one of the most prominent social workers in this part of the country, will be the speaker at the monthly meeting of the Highland Park League of Women Voters to be held on Wednesday, November 18, at the Y.W.C.A.

Her subject, "Significant Gaps in Public Provision for Child Welfare in Illinois," stresses the need for a new adoption law, a statute to raise the age of criminal responsibility to match the age of juvenile court jurisdiction and the need of a public welfare local unit bill.

Miss Benjamin, an authority on social question, is eminently qualified to speak on her topic. In addition to an M. A. from the Graduate School of Social Service Administration of the University of Chicago she has a background of case work experience as Assistant Probation Officer in the Cook County Juvenile Court under Judge Bartelme and as Senior Case Worker with the Cook County Bureau of Public Welfare. She has recently completed a study of work done on Child Welfare in Texas which will be published in December by the University of Texas.

Luncheon will be served at 12:15 followed by a brief business meeting. Mrs. V. Wm. Briddle, chairman of the Department of Government and Child Welfare of the Highland Park League, who secured the speaker, will be in charge of the meeting. All members are urged to attend.
