Mr. Bulliet, in Saturday's Daily News, paid high tribute to Mr. Williams' paintings, as have many other Chicago critics.

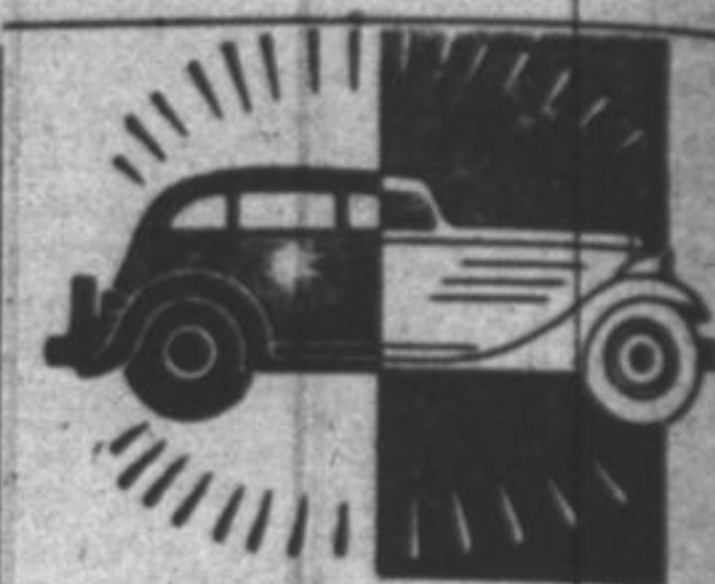
Quite a number from this vicinity have attended this exhibit of Hoosier artists.
