Record Vote Cast in West Deerfield

Never before has Deerfield seen so many voters as in the November third election. The vote surpassed all expectations. Precinct 1 (East) of West Deerfield township, recorded 223 voters; Precinct 2 (West), 651, and Precinct 3 (Everett), 298. In the east precinct the registration showed 628 voters and 150 additional names were entered by affidavits. In the west precinct 632 voters were registered and 86 filed affidavits on election day.

A total of 1,672 votes were cast in the presidential election in West Deerfield township.

West Deerfield followed suit with the county, casting a vote in all three precincts, about 2-1 for the Republican party. 451 votes were polled for Landon in the east precinct and 415 in the west precinct, while President Roosevelt received 223 in the west and 239 in the east precincts. Five votes in the west and seventeen in the east precincts were marked for William Lemke.

In the county election, Mason won over Bairstow by a large margin, receiving 1,065 against 487 in West Deerfield. Returns for other candidates were as follows: Drury (D) 432 was defeated by L. J. Wilmot Court (R) 1,093, for Clerk of the Circuit Court; Coroner John L. Taylor with 1,087 lead Dr. B. Lemery (D) with 466; Robert Pearsall polled 1,075 over McDermott with 475 for auditor.

Deerfield Legion Presents Histories to Local Schools

The Deerfield Post, American Legion Auxiliary, gave several hundred copies of "The History of Deerfield," written by Marie Ward Reichelt, to the schools of the surrounding territory this past week, to be kept in the school libraries as reference books. Some of the schools to benefit by this gift are the Deerfield Grammar school, Wilmot, Bannockburn, Tripp and Northbrook grade schools and the Highland Park and Lake Forest high schools of Deerfield-Shields townships.

In 1929 the Legion undertook a civic project and asked Mrs. Marie Ward Reichelt to gather historical material and prepare it for publication. They had planned to have it in booklet form, but in six months time, with the aid of a few pioneers and the descendants of many more, Mrs. Reichelt gathered enough material for a large volume of 215 pages.

The remaining histories which had not been sold were distributed to the schools last week through the generosity of the American Legion, which has sponsored many fine civic projects. The Deerfield and Lake Forest Public Libraries also were the recipients of some of the histories.
