The Voice of Cookery

One week from today... Thanksgiving dinner. In some homes the menu will be very elaborate... other homes just an extra fine dinner... with that in view I've planned two menus, which you may use as I have suggested or be guided by the general outline.

Menu No. 1 Cranberry Cocktail Philadelphia Oyster stew Soup crackers Roast duck or Roast chicken (Apple stuffing for duck) Mashed potatoes Rutabagoes Cider gelatin salad Mince pie cheese Coffee Nuts

Menu No. 2 Surprise Cocktail Jellied tomato bouillon Celery radishes olives Roast turkey Chestnut dressing giblet gravy Whipped potatoes Baked acorn squash Cranberry-Grape salad Brazil pumpkin pie Mince tartlets Coffee Nuts bonbons clustered raisins

Some of the recipes are given you for your approval and used in connection with the menus. Apple Stuffing for Duck Peel, core and chop finely 4 large

apples, blend with 2 cups stale bread crumbs, 1 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon paprika, 1 teaspoon powdered sage and the grated rind of 1/2 lemon. Moisten with 1 cup pineapple juice. Stuff duck as usual.

Mince Tartlets Make your favorite pastry, cut into 4 inch squares. Put mounds of prepared mince meat on one corner of pastry and fold triangle fashion. Seal edges. Bake in hot oven, 400 degrees F., until done.

Cranberry Cocktail Four cups water, four cups cranberries, two-thirds cup granulated sugar. Cook cranberries and water until all the skins pop open (about 5 minutes). Strain through cheese cloth. Bring the juice to boiling point; add sugar and boil for two minutes. Serve cold.

Sunrise Cocktail Pour over chopped ice, 1/2 gallon of cider, 1 quart apple jack and 1/2 pint of domestic marshchino. Shake well. Pour into cocktail glasses and garnish with slices of lemon, orange, green mint and marshchino cherries.

Cider Gelatin Salad Combine 1 tablespoon gelatin with 2 tbsps. cold water. When gelatin is softened add it to 1 pint (scant) hot cider and stir until it is dissolved. Mold. Serve with French dressing made with cider vinegar.

Household Hints

Drain all juices from fresh or canned fruits, store in icebox and use for fruit cocktails or sherbets. Always keep the top on the milk bottle. Milk exposed to the air collects particles of dust.

When buying fish see that the eyes are not sunken in and dull. A fresh fish has clear eyes and the flesh is firm to the touch.

When opening your recipe book, place a square of clear glass on the open page. It keeps the pages free of spatters and flour and the type is easily read.

One or two tablespoonfuls of sugar added to strong turnips when cooking will greatly improve their flavor.

If the pan used to scald milk is rinsed in cold water before using, the milk will not stick.

When poaching eggs, add a teaspoonful of vinegar to the water. Vinegar helps to set the whites, keeping them from spreading.

An egr poacher is excellent for

reheating vegetables. Place a mound of each thing to be heated in the little egg cups, using the steamer just as when poaching eggs. When the vegetables are thoroughly heated, turn them upside down on the plate and place a bit of butter on the mound.

A tablespoonful of tapioca sprinkled on the bottom crust of a fresh fruit pie will absorb excessive juice while baking.

Cracked eggs may be boiled in salted water and they will not come out of the shell.
