Coach Chuck Lauer's Freshman-Sophomore team defeated the Bowen lightweights in a 25 to 12 contest. Bernardi, the local's lanky forward, lead the scoring with 3 field goals and a free throw. Fröst, Summers, Inman, and Zanotti displayed team play that will be hard to beat.

Coach "Sollie" Thurston's Varsity Quintet nosed out a 21-18 win over Bowens in a whirlwind last quarter that set the crowd in an up-roar. Danny Davis paced the team with 8 of the winning points.

Tuesday evening Leyden Community high school of Franklyn Park brought their teams to the Highland Park gym. The sophomores repeated their earlier victory over Leyden by a decisive 28-4 score. The varsity revengeed an early season defeat at the hands of Leyden by winning 33-16. Thurston used 14 boys, 10 of whom broke into the scoring.
