New Powerful Land Plane Arrives on Preliminary Flight

The nation's most powerful passenger land plane arrived at Chicago Municipal Airport yesterday on

a preliminary flight from Los Angeles to New York over United Air Lines' mid-continent route, W. A. Patterson, president of the line, announced last night. It is the first of United's new \$3,000,000 fleet of twenty-eight Douglas transports, which will be known as "Mainliners," said the airline executive.

The transports are the only passenger land planes in the world with 14-cylinder double-bank radial engines, each of these Wasp motors being capable of 1,150 horsepower. United recently placed an order for sixty-eight of the new engines, the largest order in the history of air transportation for commercial powerplants of 1000 horsepower or more. With these super engines, the transport can cruise 190 miles an hour and carry enough fuel to fly United's coast-to-coast airway with only two stops.

Twenty-eight of these planes have been ordered by United and five will have been delivered within ten days. Ten will be custom-built club-car type transports with de luxe accommodations for fourteen passengers; ten will be day planes carrying twenty-one passengers, and eight will be sleeper transports for overnight coast-to-coast flights. The express pits accommodate double

the capacity of United's present transports.

The plane, brought to Chicago by E. P. Lett, United's chief of flying, will continue over the company's coast-to-coast airway to New York today, and following delivery of sis-

ter ships will inaugurate regular passenger service within the near future.

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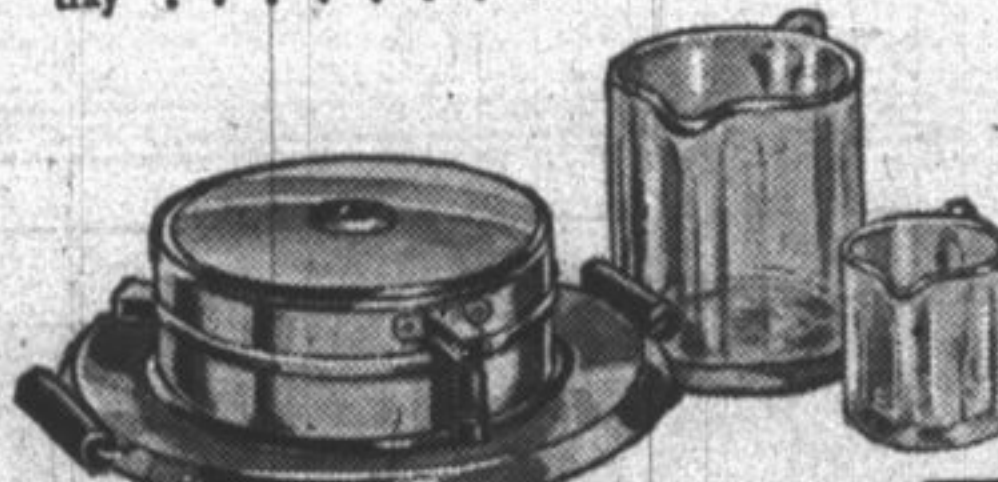

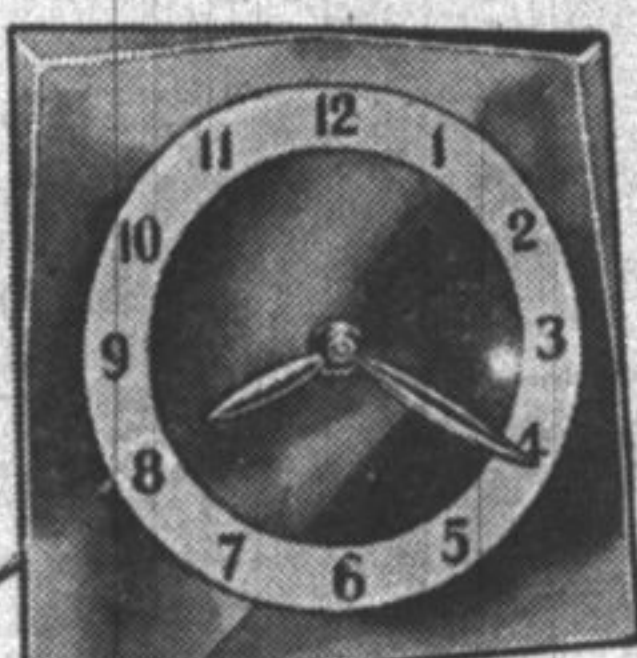

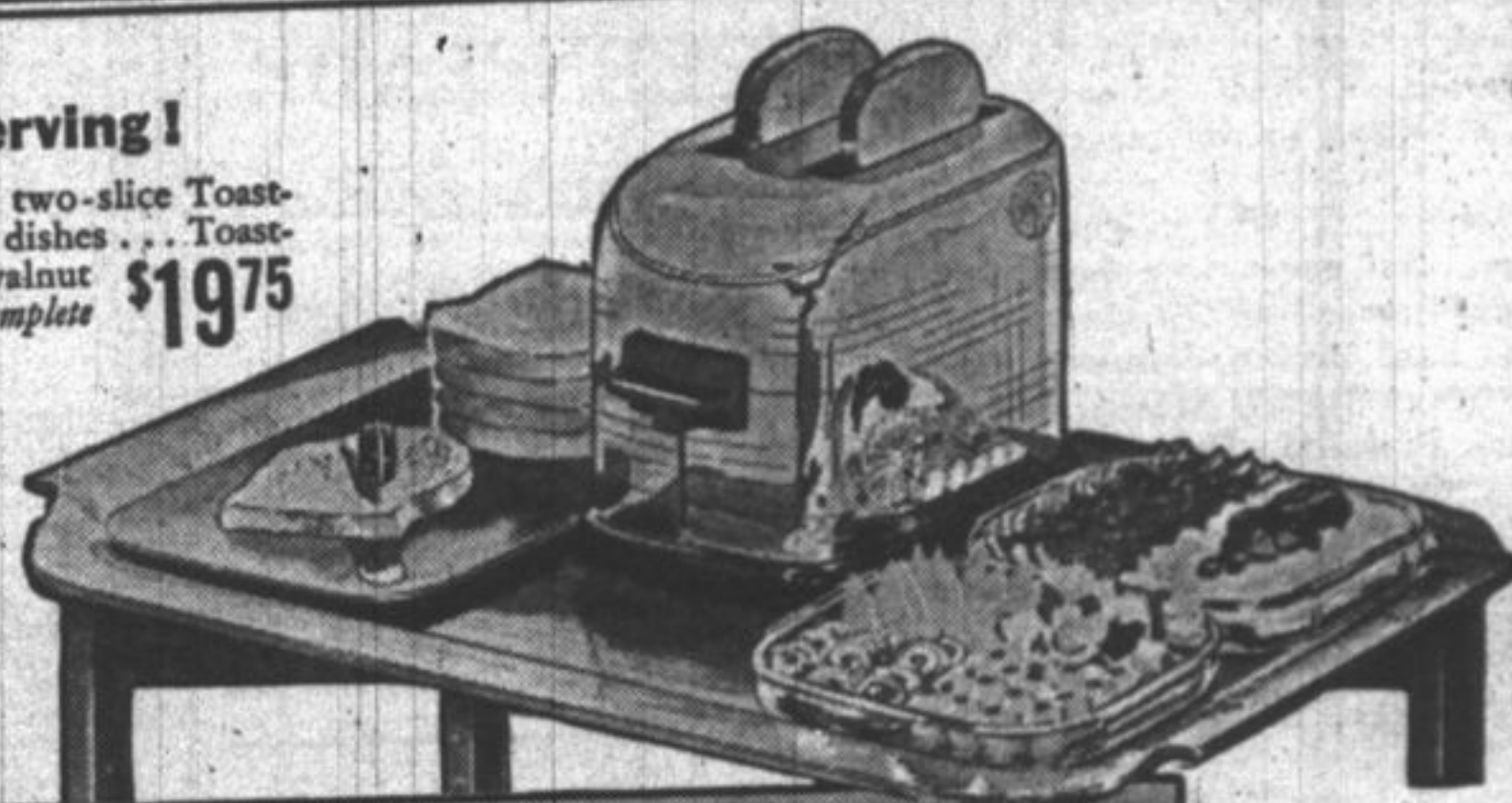
