

Heart Ailment Is Fatal Monday To Judge Shurtleff

Judge Edward D. Shurtleff, 73, former speaker of the house of representatives and veteran jurist from the 17th district of Illinois, died Monday at his home in Marengo.

He had been ill with an heart ailment for a week.

Thirty-five years of public service—20 as a member of the state legislature and 15 on the bench of the 17th judicial circuit—marked his career.

First elected judge in 1921, he twice was re-elected to six-year terms. He sat in judgment on many famous cases, including the trial of Oscar Nelson, state auditor of public accounts, who in 1931 was tried for misfeasance in office after failure of the Waukegan State bank. Judge Shurtleff directed a verdict of acquittal after hearing the evidence.

Other Famous Cases

Others were concerned with the release of James "Fur" Sammons, Chicago gangster, convicted slayer whom he released from Joliet prison on a writ of habeas corpus; the murder trial of Russell McWilliams, Rockford youth, whom he sentenced to die for the slaying of a streetcar motorman—a sentence later commuted to 99 years imprisonment by Gov. Henry Horner; and a hearing on the 1931 congressional reapportionment, which he declared invalid. The state supreme court sustained him.

During his years in the legislature, from 1900 to 1920, he served as speaker of the house from 1905 to 1911. Twice he served as chairman of the Republican party's state central committee.

In 1931, he guided the house through a legal tangle and saved from defeat the law giving the vote to women, a measure which had his fullest approval. During the fight on the law, the Democratic leaders moved to postpone consideration. Judge Shurtleff suggested that by a two-thirds vote the house could give precedence to senate measures,

of which the bill was one. His suggestion was followed, and the measure passed after four roll-calls.

Born in Genoa

Judge Shurtleff was born in Genoa, De Kalb county, Sept. 19, 1863. He was graduated from Oberlin college, and started the practice of law here in 1883.

On June 25, 1890, he married Miss Elizabeth H. Sisson, Marengo, who survives with their two children, Maurice of Sterling, Ill., and Mrs. Frederick R. Kelley, Marengo.

Presided in Waukegan

Since he first was named to succeed Judge Charles H. Donnelly of Woodstock on Jan. 5, 1921, Judge Shurtleff had been holding court in Waukegan frequently.

At the time the late Judge Claire C. Edwards resigned and during the interval up to the time Judge Dady was elected at the judicial caucus in 1930, Judge Shurtleff presided in almost continuously. Since Judge Dady has been on the bench, Judge Shurtleff came here regularly up to the time he was ordered to rest.

Within six months after Judge Shurtleff was named at the judicial convention to succeed Judge Donnelly in 1921, he was elected for a six year term. He was elected again in 1927 and in 1933. His present term would have expired in June, 1939.

Minard E. Hulse, president of the Lake County Bar association, announced the appointment of a committee to draw up a resolution condoling the death of Judge Shurtleff. The committee is comprised of Attorney Benjamin H. Miller, chairman, and Judge Dady, Attorneys Clarence W. Diver, Albert Hall, George W. Field, Eugene M. Runyard and J. A. Miller.

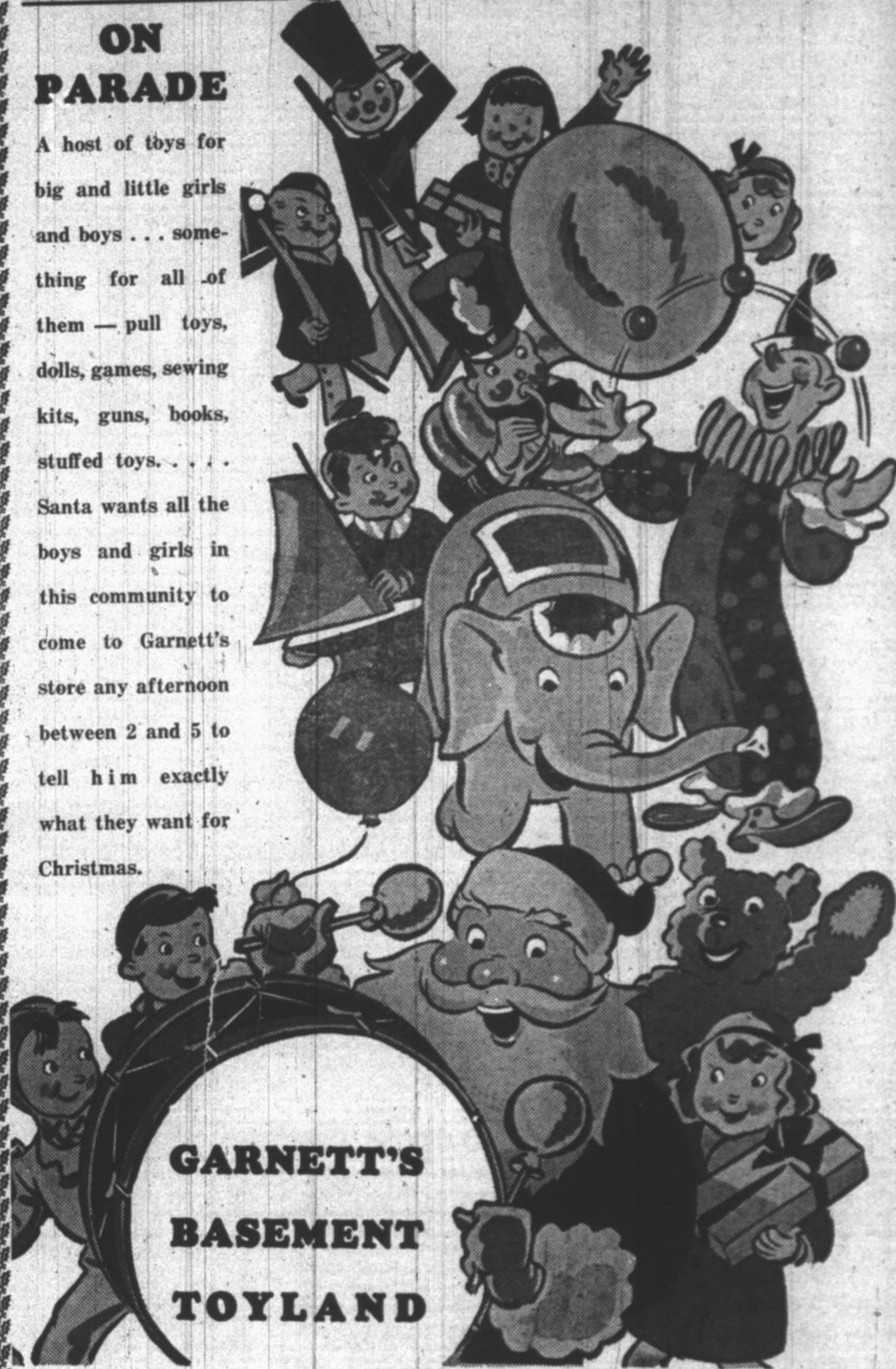
