

Appreciates Response on Security Forms

Appreciation of the splendid response of both employers and employees in Highland Park in the matter of filling out the Government forms in connection with the Social Security Act, was expressed this week by the postmaster.

Until the Regional Office of the Social Board takes over their part in the administration of the Act, the post office will continue to receive applications—both employer and employee—from those who come under the Act, and to issue account number cards. Forms will be kept on hand for this purpose.

It is greatly to the advantage of any employees who have not secured their account numbers to do so before January 1st, when their employers begin to make the wage deductions and equal contributions. Otherwise, proper credit towards their benefits may not be given.

Early Mailing

During the holiday time the volume of mail increases approximately 200 per cent. It is a physical impossibility to handle this great mass of mail matter efficiently and promptly within a few days. Therefore to assure delivery of their Christmas presents, cards, and letters by Christmas Day the public should shop and mail early. Do your Christmas shopping, so that you can mail your gifts, greetings, and letters to relatives, friends, and loved ones at least a week or 10 days before Christmas, according to the distance. This will not only make it certain that they are received before Christmas Day but will be a great aid to your postal service and to postal employees and enable them to spend the Christmas holiday with their families.

Hold CCC Replacement Enrollment in January

There is to be a CCC Replacement Enrollment the first two weeks in January, 1937.

Eligibility requirements: Age limits are 17 to 28 years, inclusive.

1. Young men from families now on public relief rolls.
2. Young men from families certified as eligible for Works Progress Administration employment.
3. Young men from families not now receiving relief but whose eligibility for relief has been verified through investigation.

Eligibility requirements for those who have previously been members of the CCC:

An honorably discharged junior is ineligible for reselection for a period of one year following the date of his discharge. He then becomes eligible to apply for reselection provided his former service was not less than four months.

Boys who are interested should get in touch with their Township Supervisors immediately in order that the supervisors may take the procedure to have these boys enrolled.

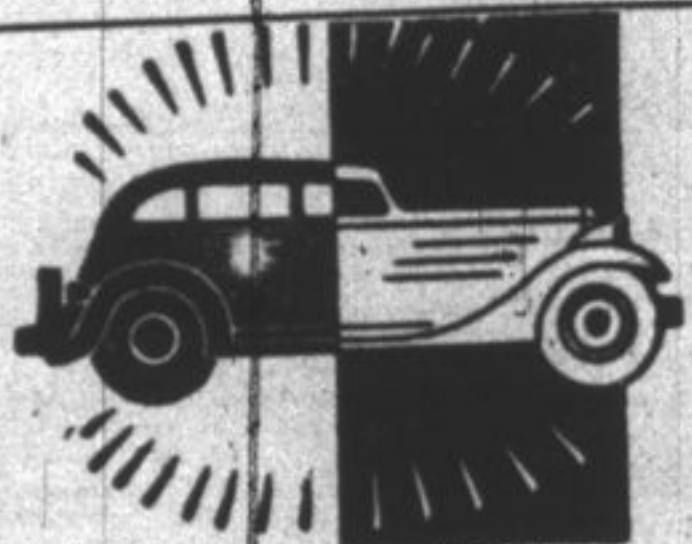

County Decline in Stamp Sale Causes Alarm

A sudden decrease in the Seal Sale returns has alarmed the Lake County Tuberculosis association as news of the large sales in other counties comes into the office. Many counties have already surpassed last year's final total. Peoria is reported leading all counties in gross returns.

Lake county has received only \$4,493.65 to date but there are some 8,500 letters yet to return contributions. Hopful that those who have kept the seals this long will send in their contributions before Christmas, the association is distributing 8,000 follow-up reminders throughout the county urging people to send in their donations at once.

The goal set for Lake county in 1937 is \$6,500. This sum is necessary if there are to be two clinics a month held in 1937 as is so urgently needed.

Deerfield Board Explains Refusal of Zoning Petition

The following letter explains the action of the Deerfield Board of Appeals, when it rejected a petition from the Illinois Real Estate Improvement association, who had requested to have their 100 foot lots divided into fifties.

Mr. Harry E. Wing, president, and members of the board,
Village of Deerfield, Illinois:

On Tuesday evening, Dec. 1, a public hearing was held before the Board of Appeals at Village hall.

The purpose of the meeting was to consider the petition of the Illinois Real Estate Improvement corporation, proposing certain changes in our zoning code as outlined in petition which appeared in the Highland Park Press, as per copy attached. Messrs. Miller and Morris appeared in behalf of the Illinois Real Estate Improvement corporation, and objected to the wording of the petition. They stated that the way the petition was drafted it would cover the whole Class "A" zone while they were only interested in the area formerly known as Gold-man's subdivision. The chairman replied that we could only act upon the petition in its present form and that there was no other alternative than presuming that the petition had been properly prepared by our attorney.

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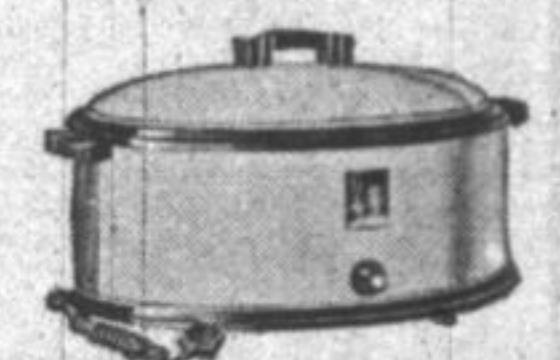
