Famous Alaskan Dog Musher at Sunday Eve Club

The world-famous Alaskan wolf-dog musher, Slim Williams, will speak on "Alaska, Our Last Frontier" before the New Trier Sunday Evening club on the 27th at 7:45 p.m. in the New Trier high school. He has spent 32 years in Alaska, going in as a pioneer, miner, big game hunter, and trapper. He has carried mail and mushed dog-teams and experienced every adventure that can come to one in the northern wilderness.

Like a character out of a book by Jack London, Slim Williams is picturesque and colorful, as rugged as the country where he has spent his life. When a Century of Progress exposition opened in Chicago in 1933, the Alaskan commercial interests sent Slim Williams to it via dog-team. He covered 5,600 miles between Copper Center, Alaska, and Washington, D. C., in order to dramatize the necessity of uniting Alaska with the United States by an automobile highway. His was the

longest dog sled trip in history. Approximately 1,800 miles were thru frozen, uncharted wilderness.

When Slim Williams arrived in Washington with his wolf-dogs, he was received with distinction by the highest officials of the capital, before whom he laid the plan of the International Highway Association of Alaska and the Yukon for a national highway to Alaska. President Roosevelt gave him several interviews. At the world's fair Mrs. Roosevelt found him the most enjoyable of her experiences.

In his lecture Slim Williams tells of going to Alaska from Texas with \$1.50 in his pocket. Potatoes were selling at \$1 each and ham and eggs at \$5. In the years since Alaska has taken to raising much of its own food and has reduced its cost 10 per cent under that in the United States. In view of Stefansson's opinion that Alaska is the real frontier between the United States and Asia, this lecture will be very interesting.
