"Although less than half of the letters sent out with Christmas Seals at Thanksgiving time have been heard from, the returns are slightly above that of last year," Mrs. Mary K. Sutor, executive secretary of the Lake County Tuberculosis association, announced today.

The association reports total receipts are now \$5,360.50 with 7,448 letters yet to be heard from. The goal for Lake county is \$6,500 and it must be reached if the chest clinics are to be maintained twice each month during 1937.

Because follow-up cards will be sent out early in January to those who have forgotten to pay for their Christmas Seals, the association urges everyone to send in his contribution as soon as possible in order to curtail the expense of the follow-up cards and letters.
