"She was a finely cultured woman with extensive and varied interests in all of which she was supreme. She was wonderful to work with, — was kind, courteous and understanding.

"After all — she passes at her zenith — in full power of attainment. We loved and honored her."

"As one who was indefatigable in work for others, Marie Ward Reichelt will be missed sorely by all who have been privileged to associate with her. Members of the high school faculty and students knew they could always count on her kindly consideration.

"The loss is ours, the memory one that we shall treasure."

"Mrs. Marie W. Reichelt contributed much to public welfare. She had a quite unusual knowledge of Deerfield people and events. Her standards and ideals for people in culture and education were unusually high.

"There was a sacrificial element in her life that was marked. She did not save herself but with strenuous effort kept right on with her important work. Thus ambition and determination made heavy demands on her strength.

"While she was an important factor in many institutions she gave a chief loyalty to her church. She was an interesting and zealous friend to her pastor. He was well assured she would be in her place in the sanctuary unless sick abed or out of the city.

"Mrs. Reichelt was the center of interest and counsel in her immediate families. After all is said about her exceptional public ministries of many kinds her deepest interests and most permanent

ministries were as Mother in her own families. "She painted no Madonnas On Chapel walls in Rome But, with a touch divine, Upon the walls of home."

Milton Florsheim Dies in California; Funeral Friday

Milton S. Florsheim, 68, founder and chairman of the board of the Florsheim Shoe company, died Sunday of heart disease at Los Angeles.

His wife, Mrs. Gertrude Stern Florsheim, and one son, Harold Florsheim of this city, were with him at the time of his death.

Also surviving are a brother, Louis, and two sisters, Cora Florsheim and Mrs. Florence Byfield.

While Mr. Florsheim maintained a home in Highland Park, he had been living at the Drake hotel in Chicago. He had been in ill health for several months and recently had gone to California to spend the winter.

He was born in Chicago and was educated in the public schools there. As a youth he went to work in the retail shoe store established by his father, Sigmund Florsheim, in 1856.

Advocating the 40-hour week early in 1932, Mr. Florsheim supported improved labor conditions but was an active critic of the NRA. He was a trustee of Northwestern university, a director of the Jewish Charities and the Chicago Tuberculosis institute and a life member of the Art institute and the Field Museum.

Recently he and Dr. Louis E. Schmidt of Chicago gave a large supply of radium to the tumor clinic of the Northwestern university medical school.

Members of his family started back from California Monday with his body. Funeral services will be held at 3:30 p.m. Friday in the chapel at Rosehill cemetery in Chicago.

Each year this party is sponsored by the Legion to take care of every child in Highland Park who Santa Claus might overlook. This year 306 were invited and each received a pair of leather wool lined gloves, a pair of wool hose, a sweater and in addition a filled stocking, candy, fruit and nuts.

Cooperating with the Chamber of Commerce the Legion erected a community Christmas tree and sent Christmas baskets to a number of needy families in the community. Special gifts and donations were made to several sick veterans and to inmates of veterans hospitals.

One of the most appreciated incidents of the Christmas program was the visit made by the Legion Santa Claus on Christmas Eve to all of the patients of the Highland Park hospital. Each was presented with a decorated candle and received a word of cheer.

Commander Miller Schreiner wishes to express his thanks to the several organizations who assisted and to the Community Chest for their assistance and the many who

so generously helped as well as the members of the Legion.
