## James B. Thorsen Former Resident Dies of Pneumonia

James B. Thorsen, former resident of this city, passed away Saturday afternoon in his apartment in the Orington hotel, Evanston, following a week's illness of pneumonia. Mr. Thorsen was 77 years old. He was a retired insurance broker and founder of the firm of James B. Thorsen and sons, Inc. of Chicago.

Mr. Thorsen was born in Copenhagen, Denmark, and came to Chicago in 1870 where he led an active life until he retired two years ago.

He is survived by his widow, Florence M., and six sons, J. Mitchell, Kenore and Theodore of New York, George of East Dover, Ct.; Waldo of Highland Park and Ralph of Chicago and two daughters, Mrs. H. V. Taylor of Evanston and Mrs. Donald Lawder of Greenwich, Conn.

Funeral services were held Monday morning at 11:30 a.m. in the chapel at 1460 Sherman ave., Evanston. Cremation followed.

## Births Outnumber Deaths in County

There were 549 more births than deaths in Lake county during the year ending Dec. 1, according to the vital statistics records in the office of County Clerk Russ Alford. For the 12 months ending Dec. 1 there were 1,643 births and 1,094 deaths.

While there were nine more births recorded this year than in 1935, when 1,634 birth certificates were entered, there were also 39 more deaths than last when 1,055 persons died.

The number of marriage licenses issued in the county clerk's office during the same period dropped to 4,009, compared to 5,886 last year. The decrease was due mainly to the change in the administration of the county clerk's office whereby out of county applicants for marriage licenses cannot obtain them after 5 p.m. on weekdays and noon on Saturdays.
