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The Publishers Weekly, the organ of the book trade, printed this week an interesting article under the heading "Currents in the Trade." The general content of the article aims to show that present day popular titles live longer than formerly. Christmas sales records have brought this to the attention of the book sellers, and librarians report that these titles are still requested. The first book mentioned is Alexis Carrel's "Man the Unknown," published originally in September, 1935 and still read. John Genter's timely book, "Inside Europe," published early in the year (February) is still widely read and English agents report it to be the most popular book by an American published in England in ten years. "Anthony Adverse," which was published in 1934, has had several special editions, each reviving interest in it, and now the movie version has put it back on the "best seller" list. Anne Lindbergh's "North to the Orient," published in the early fall of 1935, is still selling. "My Country and My People" by Lun Yutong, was published in September, 1935, and enjoyed a successful second Christmas season. "Mary Poppins,"

published over two years ago, and its sequel "Mary Poppins Comes Back" were published as juvenile but are enjoyed by adults, as a lively Christmas selling would indicate. "Fur," by Bachrach. This is a practical discussion of the fur industry. The opening chapters tell of the parts of the world where furs are grown and what influences the growth of different types of furs. In the succeeding chapters the general types of fur-bearing animals are classified into smaller groups and given their fur-trade names. Detailed discussion of the blemishes found in pelts and the methods of handling them are included. Material about fur-farming and buying and selling of pelts concludes the book.

MUSIC—An eight-volume set of music has just been added to the library collection. The selections are those which are familiar to all because of their repeated performance on the radio. Included in the eight-volume set are: "Classic and Romantic Compositions"; "Modern Compositions"; "Grand Opera Excerpts"; "Standard and Modern Dance Music"; and "Opera Songs and Sacred Music."

A friendly little English lad, the son of divorced parents, spends part of his year in a poverty-stricken neighborhood with his father a struggling architect. Here he meets boys who are potential criminals due to their deficient home conditions and lack of understanding guidance. A worthwhile film with something for any type of audience. Family.
