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Mrs. A. O. Mason's Mother Dies in Waukegan, Tuesday Mr. Harriett Hallowell Moody, a pioneer resident of Waukegan, died Tuesday afternoon in that city. She was the mother of Mrs. A. O. Mason of this city. Born in 1850; she came to Waukegan from Massachusetts with her parents in the early days, settling in what was known at that time as "Little Fort." Her parents were of New England birth, and both of her grandfathers served as officers during the Revolutionary war. Mrs. Moody was one of the oldest living high school teachers, at the time of her death, having taught in Waukegan high school. Five years ago, she was struck by an automobile and since has been an invalid. Funeral services will be held this afternoon (Thursday) at 2 o'clock in Waukegan. Interment will be in Waukegan cemetery. Besides her only daughter she leaves two grandchildren, Doris and Osborne, to survive her.
