The speaker of the evening was Mr. Thomas J. Keane, national director of senior scouting and his subject was "The Crusade for Youth." ### Pres. Roosevelt to Speak to Scouts

The President of the United States will speak to the Scouts of America on the occasion of the 27th anniversary of the movement on February 8, Monday at 4:30 Central Standard Time. President Walter W. Head and Dr. James E. West, the Chief Scout executive, will participate in this ceremony from the White House. Eight Eagle Scouts will be present when the President of the United States addresses their fellow Scouts.

The Blue Network of the National Broadcasting company and the coast-to-coast networks of both the Columbia and National Broadcasting Systems and the entire Mutual Broadcasting Service will carry this program, the outstanding event of Boy Scout Week.

### Reregister Large Percentage

Troops reregistering for the year 1937 show a marked increase of percentage of individual boys reregistering over the number which registered last January. Not all troops have as yet sent in the papers but indications show that approximately 75 per cent reregistration will be recorded when all papers are in.

### Missionary Society Meets

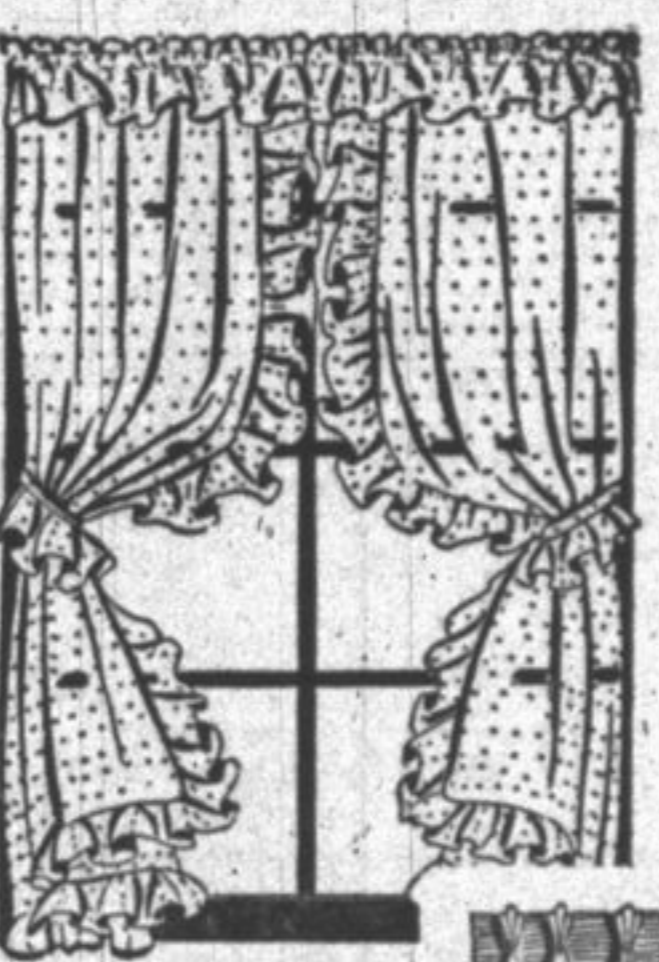
