For the four Saturdays preceding Easter, Dr. W. F. Weir will have a communicants class for young people of the church. Communion ser-

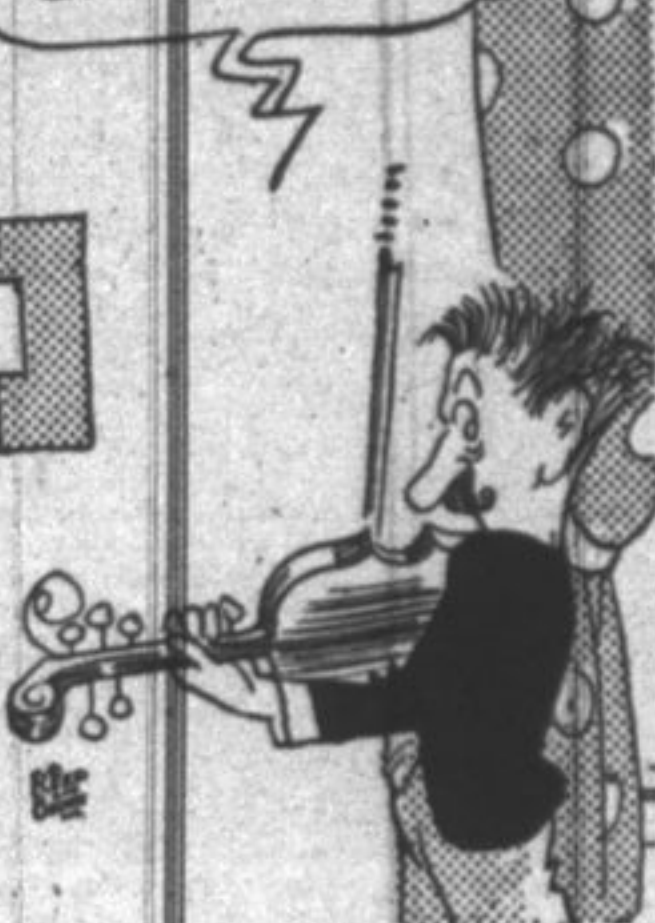
VICES will be held on Good Friday evening at 8 o'clock.
