Among the citations which comprised the Lesson-Sermon was the following from the Bible: "Master, which is the great commandment in the law? Jesus said unto him, Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy mind" (Matthew 22:36-37).

The Lesson-Sermon also included the following passages from the Christian Science textbook, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures," by Mary Baker Eddy: "The proper use of the word soul can always be gained by substituting the word God, where the definite meaning is required. In other cases, use the word sense, and you will have the scientific signification. As used in Christian Science, soul is properly the synonym of Spirit, or God; but out of Science, soul is identical with sense, with material sense" (p. 482).
