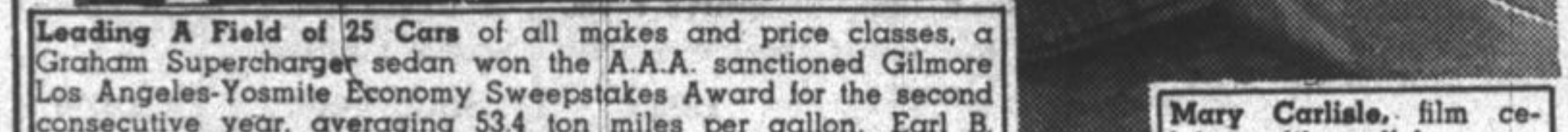

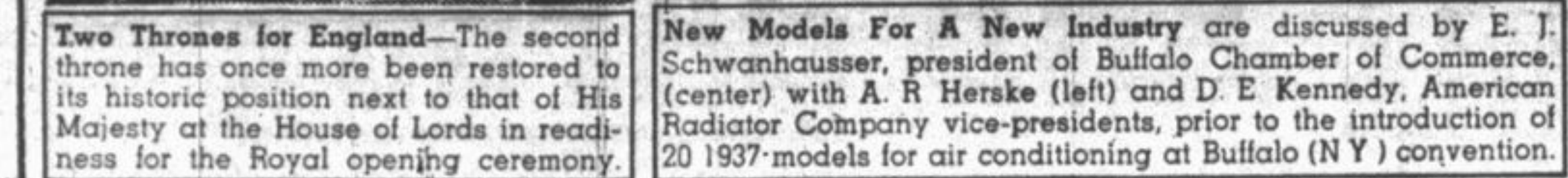

Today's Driving Hint



"It's the little things that count." The origin of that phrase is lost in antiquity, but the truth of it will never die. Applied to driving it is very apt, because there probably is no action or process where "little things" are more important. Here are a few brought to mind by the coming change in season:

1. Clean your shoes of mud or snow before getting into the car, and you will never have to say to a judge, "My foot slipped off the brake onto the accelerator."

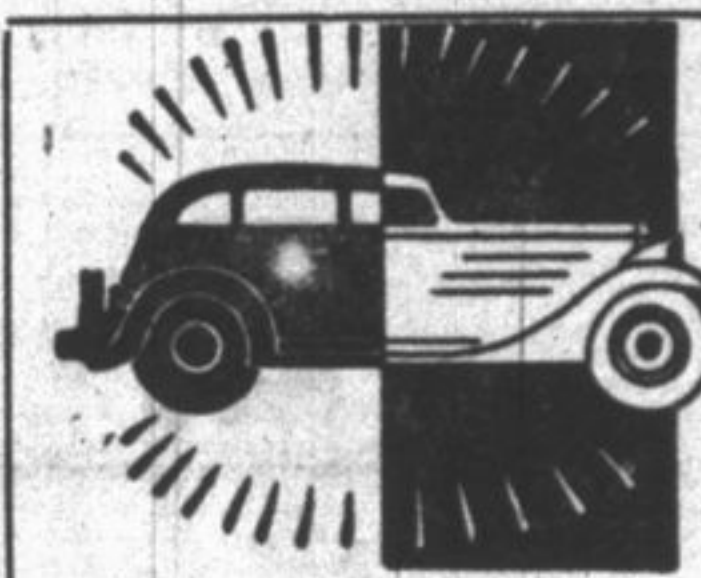
2. If you wear gloves when driving, wear the kind which will not slip on the steering wheel. Most leather gloves afford a good grip; cloth gloves do not.

3. Clean your running-board. Ice or snow can be the cause of a bad fall when alighting from or entering the car.

4. Check your tire pressure. Tires require considerable attention in the winter; a casual glance at the wheels before you get into the car usually will tell you whether the pressure is up or down. DON'T carry more pressure than is required, because an over-inflated tire presents a smaller tractive surface to the road. On winter's slippery streets you need all the traction you can get.

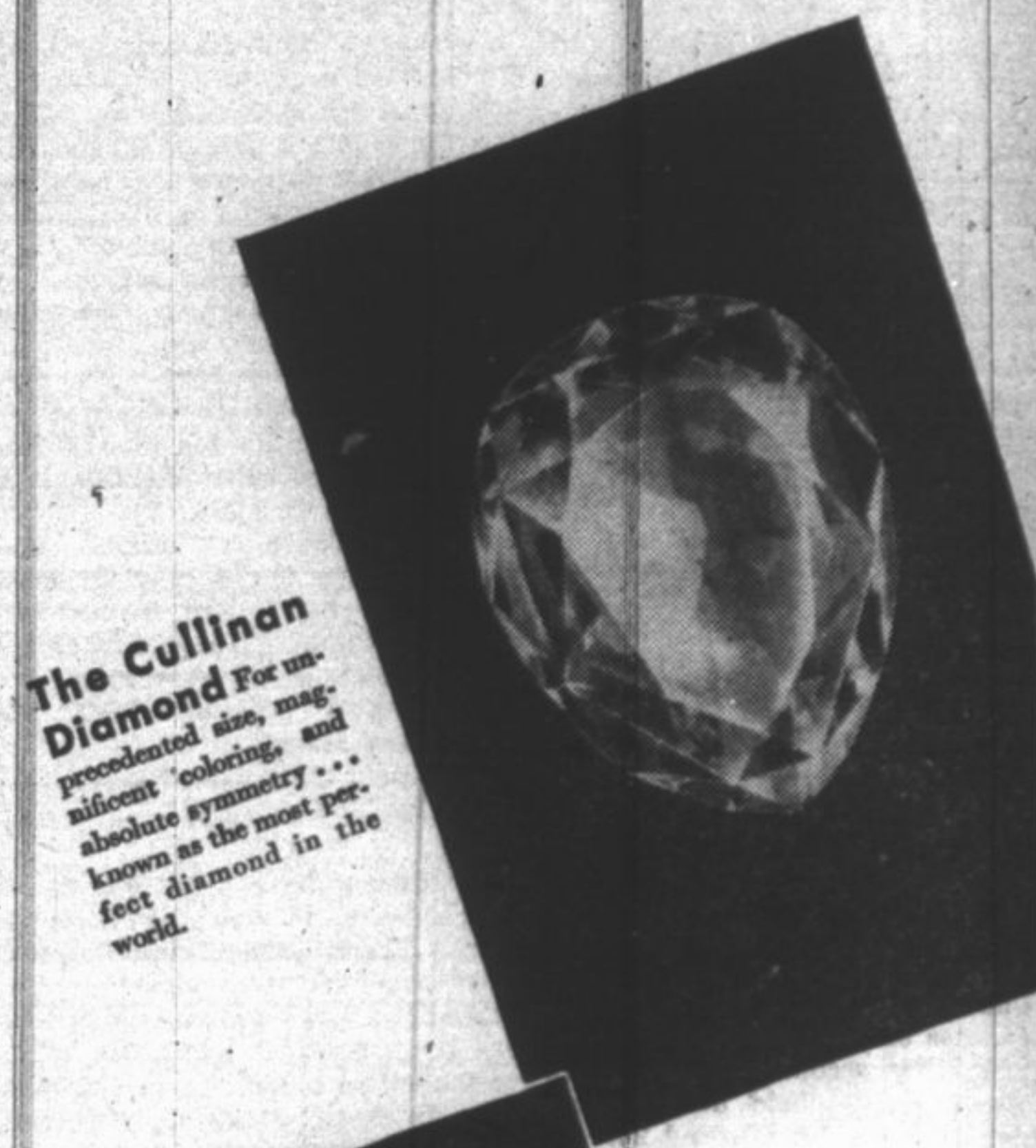

Child Study Class Meets on Monday

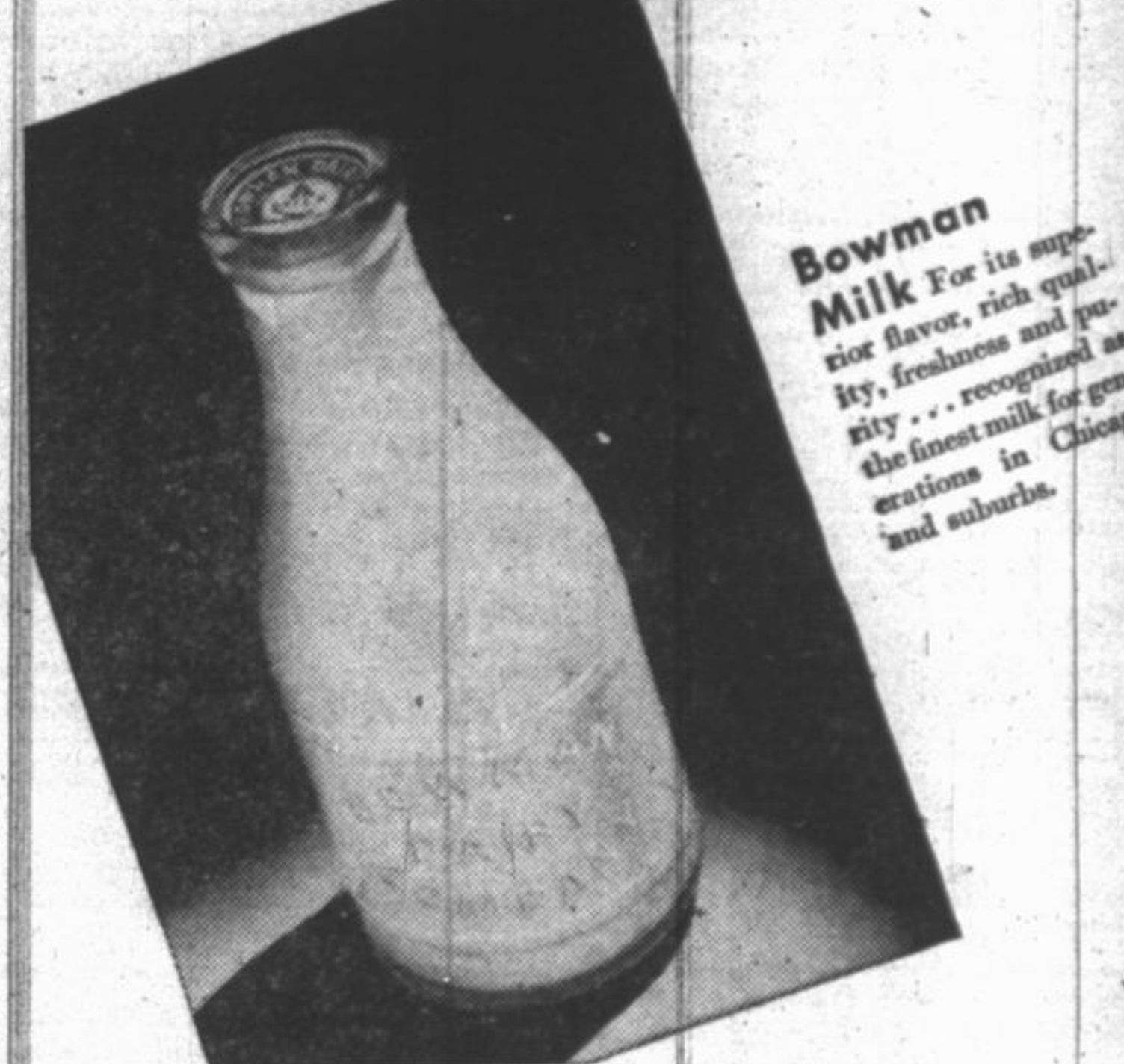
