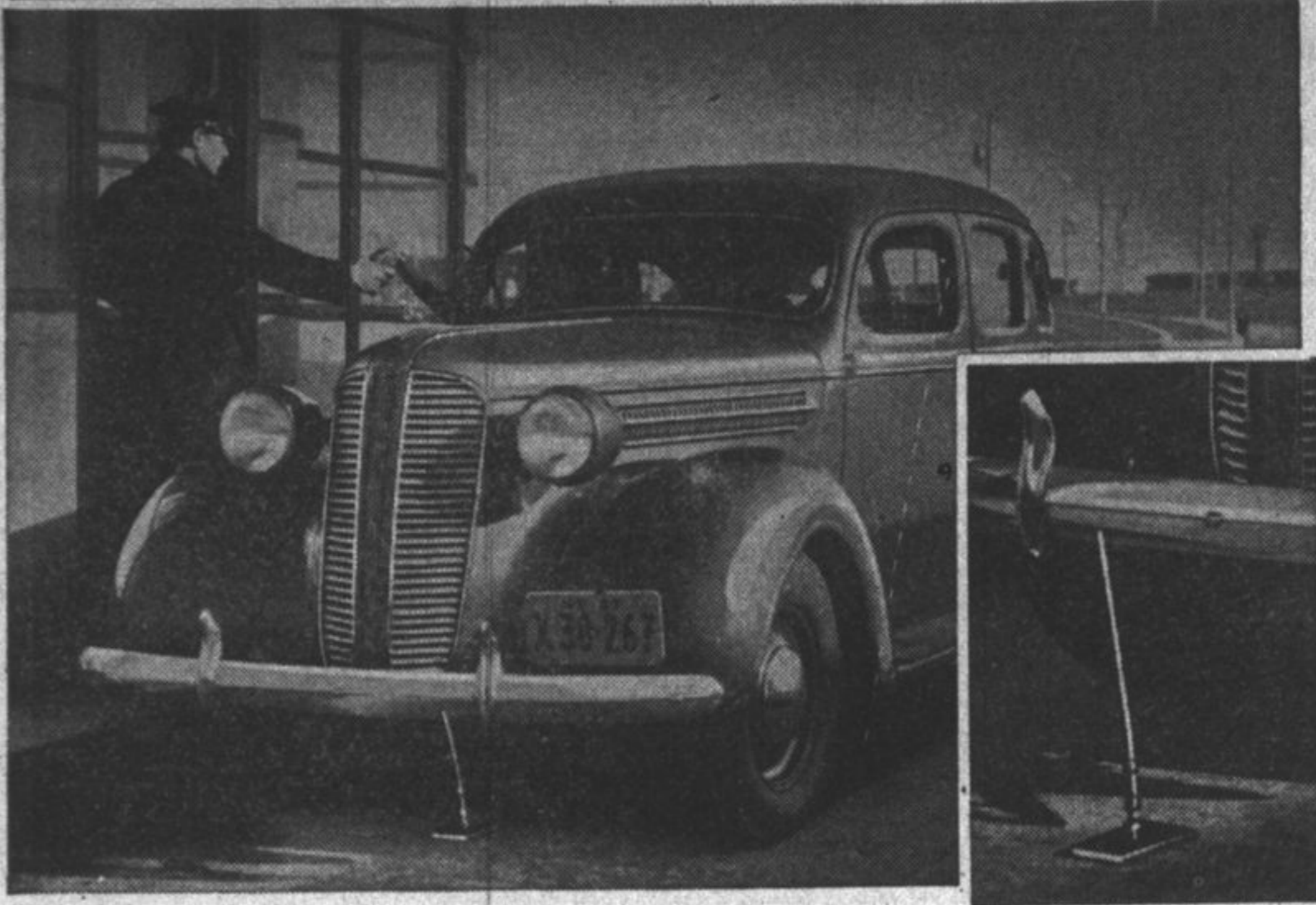


Motorists Were "Shocked"



When motorists began to stream over New York's new tri-borough bridge, they were "shocked." Something, perhaps friction set up between the car wheels and the pavement, charged the car and its occupants with electricity which was more or less violently discharged the moment the driver of the car and the toll collector of the bridge touched hands. The problem was solved by mechanical dischargers in the form of flexible wiping rods which shunted the static into the steel structure of the bridge, and in that manner forestalled the "shocking experience." Britton I. Budd Severs Connection With Railways Feb. 20

Britton I. Budd, for more than a quarter of a century a leading figure in the electric railway industry in Chicago, severed all his official connections with Chicago transportation Saturday.

He resigned as co-trustee of the Chicago Rapid Transit company, and as receiver of the Chicago, Aurora & Elgin and the Chicago, North Shore & Milwaukee electric railroads, all now in receivership.

Federal Judge James H. Wilkerson announced that Col. A. A. Sprague had been designated as sole trustee of the elevated lines.

Judge Wilkerson said Budd had asked to be relieved months ago, because of his duties as president of the Public Service Company of Northern Illinois.

The Public Service company is perfecting a consolidation of ownership with the Commonwealth Edison company, the Western United Gas & Electric company and the Illinois Northern Utilities company. Budd has been president of the Public Service company since 1923.

As a youth, Budd entered the employ of the elevated company in 1895.

By 1905, he had become president of the Metropolitan West Side line; in 1911 he became president of the operating company for the North, West and South side lines. When the elevated lines were consolidated in 1923, he was elected head of this concern, the Chicago Rapid Transit company. He resigned these offices in 1932, along with the elevated presidency, when he was appointed receiver for them.

Mr. & Mrs. Budd were former residents of Highland Park.

Game Laws Parley in Elgin Feb. 2

Duck hunters of the Highland Park region, and from throughout Northern Illinois are invited to Elgin on Tuesday afternoon, February 23, for a game laws parley at which executives of the United States Biological Survey will be the principal speakers.

Chief aim of the meeting will be to impress upon the Federal officers the need for an extension of the duck hunting season in this area to include the 60-day period from October 1, to November 30, each year, instead of the November 30-day season now in force.

Elgin chapter of the Kane County Sportsmen's league, sponsors of the parley—which will begin at 1:30 in the afternoon and will be held at the Masonic temple—charges that the present Illinois duck hunting season discriminates against the Northern Illinoisian in favor of hunters downstate.

"Often times sloughs and ponds in this section are frozen over by early November, and there is no duck hunting left," stated Earl L. Keeney, president of the Sportsmen's group. "It is to seek a fairer distribution of the season and to afford all hunters of the state an even break, that the Elgin meeting has been called. All sportsmen who question the fairness of the present arrangement as to legal hunting dates, should attend and state their case."

Ira N. Carbrison, head of the Biological Survey, Washington, D. C., will be the principal speaker.

An evening Sportsmen's banquet will conclude the program.

H. P. High School Splits Two With Evanston Friday

Willard Ludlow of the Highland Park Frosh-Soph basketballers let loose a barrage of field goals in the Evanston game Friday night that led his team to victory. Ludlow counted 5 field goals and a free throw in the first half but failed to find the basket in the second frame. The final score found Highland Park in the lead 15-13. This game maintained the local's hold on a tie for third place in the Suburban league with Morton.

After leading at half-time 19-13, the Evanston varsity staged a "sit-down" game in the third quarter. The Evanston crew tossed the ball among themselves in mid-court for the entire period while the crowd hooted for action. Not until the last quarter when Highland Park shifted to a man-to-man defense did anyone so much as risk a shot at the basket. The score was close most of the way, though. Evanston was never caught with less than a three point margin. The final count was 31-20.

The Secretary of State of Illinois is the State Librarian. The State Library and Archives Division under his jurisdiction contain much information concerning your State. Any questions which are of particular interest to readers and which are not covered in this series will be answered immediately. Address all communications: Edward J. Q. What newspaper in Springfield was owned by Governor Ninian Edwards?

A. The Sangamo Spectator, the first paper established in the future Capital in 1827.

Q. Who administered the oath of office on the first inauguration of Lincoln to the presidency?

A. Chief Justice Taney, who was the author of the famous Dred Scott decision.

Q. Who was Captain George R. Weber?

A. Publisher of the Illinois Republican at Springfield. He came to Illinois from Maryland in 1835.

Q. When and where was "Wild Bill" Hickok born?

A. At Tony Grove, Illinois (then known as Homer), May 27, 1837.

Q. When was the "Wild Bill" Hickok memorial at Troy Grove dedicated?

A. August 29, 1930.

Q. By whom was the Kaskaskia Western Intelligence established?

A. Daniel P. Cook and Co. in April 1816.

Q. Who were the publishers of the First Constitution of the State of Illinois in 1818?

A. Robert Blackwell and Elijah Conway Berry.

Q. What newspaper did Blackwell and Berry publish?

A. The Illinois Intelligencer, successor in 1818 to the Western Intelligencer.

Q. What are known as "The Seven Wonders of Egypt" (southern Illinois)?

A. Seven archaic stone walls — Giant City Stone Fort (Jackson county), Old Stone Fort (Saline county), The Pounds (Gallatin county), Draper's Bluff (Union-Jackson counties), Cormick Bluff (Johnson county), Water Lane Bounds (Pope county), the War Bluff (Pope county).

Q. Where is Bob Upton's Cave?

A. Mississippi Palisades State Park near Savanna, Illinois.
