Historic Facts of Highland Park's Community Service

For the past two weeks in the Press we have been telling about the early history of Highland Park's Community Service Inc. Today let us carry on starting with October,

After a careful study of the recreation needs of the town the following activities were conducted: touch football, gym classes for men and women, first aid lessons and leadership at social gatherings. The program was inadequate as no community center was available.

Then in November, 1932, the Highland Park Elks club offered the use of their hall at Laurel and Mc-Govern to Community Service Inc.,

to be used as a community building The staff assisted by voiunteers fitted and painted the Elks hall, and on December 12 the community center was opened. There was a small membership fee which entitled members the use of the playroom, gymnasium and classes. This center was used by boys, young and old, men, womens gym class, boy scouts, girl scouts, Highland Park band, Naval Communication Reserves, basketball groups, volleyball classes and many other activities.

In the spring softball leagues were run, as were bird hikes, track and field meets, kite flying contests. During the winter of '83-'34 a basketball league composed of all the interested grade schools of and near Highland Park was successfully conducted. Community Service officials also cared for football games, ice meets, freethrow tournaments for boys and girls.

Ravinia volleyball was the first class sponsored by the Community Service and it is still a very active group. Some men who have played all this time are: Harry Best, Arthur Raff, Edwin Benson, Howard Copp, Larry Meyers, Dr. Trangmar,

During the Christmas and Easter school recess there have been recreation, basketball and softball classes became a regular activity at Ravinia school. Here players enjoy Badminton twice weekly under the leadership of Howard Copp. The game had grown and now nearly 200 Highland Parkers enjoy this interesting game.

In February 1935 there was considerable agitation for a community center, however, after several commitees had made reports concerning this possibility, little was done to bring about such a building.

The community center on Launel during 1935 showed much activity and fourteen different activities were regularly carried on with such

In the Fall of 1935 it was found that the community center was no longer available and so plans had to be made for Community Service Inc. to carry on a different type of program. Next week will conclude the series of history talks.


