

Bertha Ostrar As Guest Artist on H. S. Program April 4



Miss Bertha Ostrar will appear as guest artist with the Highland Park High School Symphony orchestra on Sunday afternoon, April 4, when they appear in concert at the High School.

Bertha Ostrar, Chicago pianist, is considered one of the most talented and brilliant artists among the younger generation according to the critics and musical authorities, including Dr. Frederick Stock. Beginning music at an early age, she studied with different teachers until spring 1935, when she became a member of the young artists' class of Walter Knupfer of Wilmette, under whose guidance she developed an artistic finish and a maturity of style quite unusual for a girl of twenty.

With Herbert Horn another member of Mr. Knupfer's young artist class as a partner, Miss Ostrar was honored with an invitation by Dr. Frederick Stock to play the piano part in "The Animals' Carnival" by Saint-Saens at the young people's concert of the Chicago Symphony orchestra, Wednesday, March 17.

Nearly 100 Years old Seeks Employment

Oldest active job-hunter in Chicago, so far as official records indicate, is Charles Martin, of 651 West Madison street, who is registered with the Central Labor office of the Illinois State Employment Service at 1021 South State street. Martin was born in Lithuania on October 16, 1837, which makes him just eight months short of one hundred years of age. He insists, however, arithmetic or no arithmetic, that he is only ninety-eight.

Martin has been living in Chicago for sixty-two years—ever since he came over from Lithuania. He is not a citizen. "I've been intending, ever since I got here, to take out my first papers," he says, "but somehow I've kept putting it off. I expect to go down almost any day now and make my declaration of intention."

Most of his life in America, Mr. Martin worked as an extra gang section hand for various railroads. Last job he had ended in 1916.

Federal Art Project Theme of Talk by Florence Arquin

It will be very interesting to hear the talk, sponsored by the Adult Education Council, Thursday evening, at 8:15 at the high school, given by Miss Florence Arquin, assistant director on the subject, "What Is the Federal Art Project Accomplishing?"

Anyone who has ever visited at the Project studio on the near North Side in Chicago will be eager to hear more about this group of rehabilitated artists who are busily and happily engaged in constructive art work. Miss Arquin's talk will be illustrated with slides, showing some of the fine work already accomplished.

The depression was especially hard on artists, the demand for whose work slumped considerably, so that real distress resulted. This Federal Art project has not only restored the morale of the artists, but is giving them a natural outlet for their fine capacities. They are engaged in making posters for educational health campaigns, in painting school murals and constructing fountains, in making backgrounds for the Brookfield Zoo, and in doing much needed work for the Field Museum.

Miss Arquin is an instructor at the Art Museum in Chicago, and is most enthusiastic about the Art Project. Her lively talk will be delightful and instructive.
