Sunrise Service to Be Held Easter at Soldiers Field

Thousands of early Easter worshippers are expected to throng into Soldier Field at 6:30 a.m., Sunday, March 28, for the Fifth Annual Easter Sunrise Service to be held in Chicago since the first year of A Century of Progress, Harry G. Saulnier, chairman, announced today.
 Dr. Robert Crawford McQuilkin, president of Columbia College, Columbia, South Carolina, internationally known editor and educator, will be the speaker.
 John F. Fletcher and his 90-piece Wheaton College Band and a chorus choir of 2500 voices, led by Pro. Talmadge J. Bittkofer, will be the musical attractions.
 From 6:30 to 7 o'clock the service

is to be broadcast over the Blue Network of the National Broadcasting Company, and from 6:30 to 7:30 over WMAQ, Chicago Daily News station, as the Chicago outlet.

Beginning with 20,000 persons in the Hall of Science at the World's Fair in 1933, the Easter Sunrise Service has grown to an attendance of 40,000 or more and this year has been included in the Chicago Jubilee Celebration.
 Newspapers, transportation companies, radio stations, public service systems, and other organizations, join hands in informing and conveying old and young from every denomination to Soldier Field where they assemble in solemn worship at the foot of a giant white cross, and proclaim their faith and hope in the resurrection of the Savior more than 1900 years ago.
