Soups . . . more than ever these days the homemakers is serving soup . . . whether or not she makes it or buys canned varieties . . . makes no difference . . . she still serves soup.

In this issue . . . for the homemakers that still want to prepare their own soup from stock, or otherwise I have a few delicious recipes.

### Cream of Watercress

Put 1/4 cup of butter in the upper part of a double boiler, place it over direct heat. When butter is melted add 1/2 cup of onions, minced fine. Brown until the onion is tender, stirring often. Add 1/4 cup of flour and blend then stir in gradually 4 cups of milk. When milk begins to thicken, place it over boiling hot water and cook for 15 minutes. Add 2 cups of chopped watercress. Season with salt and serve very hot flecked with paprika.

### Lima Bean Chowder

Wash 1 cup of dried lima beans, cover with cold water and allow to soak for several hours. Cook until tender, drain and reserve both beans and liquid. In the meantime, try out 1 cup of diced salt pork and add to it an onion, sliced. Cook about 5 minutes stirring often. Add 1 1/2 cups of diced raw potatoes and 2 cups of the water in which the beans were cooked. Cook until the potatoes are soft; then add the lima beans. Thicken 3 cups of evaporated milk (full strength) with 2 tbsps. each of flour and butter. Add to the other mixture, season with salt and pepper. If desired, add a half dozen crackers split and soaked in milk. Serve very hot.

### Puree of Peas with Mushrooms

Peel and cut in pieces 1 pint of fresh mushrooms; saute in 2 tbsps. butter until delicately browned, add 1 pint of cream, cook slowly until number two can of peas put tender and add the contents of a

through a sieve; add 1/4 teas. salt and a dash of paprika. Serve with crackers.

### Bean Soup

1 pound beans  
2 teas. salt  
1 pound ham shank  
2 tbsps. flour  
3 cups water  
1/2 teas. pepper  
2 tbsps. butter

Soak any kind of dried beans over night. The next morning drain them. Put them in a soup kettle with cold water, salt and pepper and the ham shank (onion juice or other seasonings may be used if desired) cover and simmer about 2 hours. Then strain. Cream the butter and flour together. Add 1 cup of the warm stock slowly, stirring constantly. Then pour this into the soup, and stir until it reaches the boiling point, to cook the flour. This soup may be prepared in the oven, and if this is done, bring to a boil, and place in a 275 degrees F., oven for 3 hours.

### Provincetown Chowder

1 cup chopped salt pork  
1/2 cup peas  
2 cups milk  
1 cup beans, cut julienne\*  
1 teas. salt  
3 tbsps. flour  
1 cup carrots, diced  
1 tbsps. whole pickling spice  
1 cup potatoes  
2 onions, sliced thin  
2 1/2 cups water

Saute salt pork until lightly browned. Add onions and cook for 2 or 3 minutes. Add raw vegetables and spices, tied in a bag, and water to a thick paste and add to soup. Stir until thickened, remove spice bag. Add milk. Heat and serve immediately.

\*To julienne: cut in long thin strips).

## National Show in Chicago to Boom Home Building

With leading associations in the building and allied industries co-operating and working for its success, the National House and Garden Exposition to be held at the Coliseum May 8 to 16 looms as an important contribution in the re-

vival of residential construction and home modernization.

The Brick Manufacturers association, Portland Cement association, Illinois Master Plumbers association, Central Division of the Architects Small Home Service bureau, National Warm Air Heating and Air Conditioning association, Metal Lath association, Illinois Chapter of the American Society of Heating and Ventilating Engineers, Oil Heat

committee, Burning Oil Distributors association and the Garden Department of the Illinois Federation of Women's clubs have endorsed the exhibition which will reveal the newest ideas in home building and equipment and will offer to the prospective home builder all the latest information concerning design, construction materials and financing the home. Landscaping and gardening will be stressed as important features in residential beautification.

The central feature of the show will be a home of modern Colonial design which will occupy 2,400 square feet with its seven rooms and attached garage all on one floor. Designed by White and Weber, Chicago architects, the house will embody all the novelties of proven practicability in residential construction and combining durability, economy of maintenance, fuel savings and safety against fire hazards. It will be fully insulated and will have one of the most modern and efficient combination heating and air-conditioning plants.

One of the departments of the show will be devoted to educational exhibits including interesting contrasts in the evolution of the kitchen, the bathroom and the heating of the home, depicting the styles

shown in actual use in the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries compared with the modern equipment of today.

Another interesting exhibit will be known as "tiny towns" in which miniature models of homes submitted by participants in a house designing contests will be shown.

John A. Servas, veteran exposition builder, is manager of the show. Last year he staged home exhibitions in co-operation with the National Real Estate Board and the Federal Housing Administration in Chicago, Baltimore, Miami, Fla., Houston and Fort Worth, Texas. He planned and developed the Horticultural Exhibit at A Century of Progress and staged the first floor flower shows held at the Navy Pier and similar displays at the Chicago Stadium, the Hotel Sherman, and the Merchandise Mart.

Carl E. Heimbrodt, chairman of the show committee, is president of

the Central Division of the Architects Small Home Service bureau, a member of the Architects club of Chicago and the Illinois Society of Architects as well as the American Institute of Architects. He is consulting architect for the Electric association.

"Home betterment will be the theme of the exposition," said Mr. Heimbrodt. "We are planning a

show that will be of interest not only to home owners and prospective home builders but to all householders as well."

Headquarters for the show have been opened in the Builders' building at 228 North LaSalle street.
