The W. C. T. U. met at the home of Mrs. Earl Fritsch, 336 Orchard lane, on Wednesday, March 17, at 2 o'clock.

Twenty-five per cent of the 1,344 traffic casualties to date this year were caused by over indulgence in intoxicants, asserted E. Raymond Cato, chief of the California State Highway patrol, in an address before more than 300 delegates attending the annual convention of the State Peace Officers Association of California.

Chief Cato closed his address with

a plea to all law enforcement agencies to co-operate in the campaign to do away with the evils of "drunken driving."

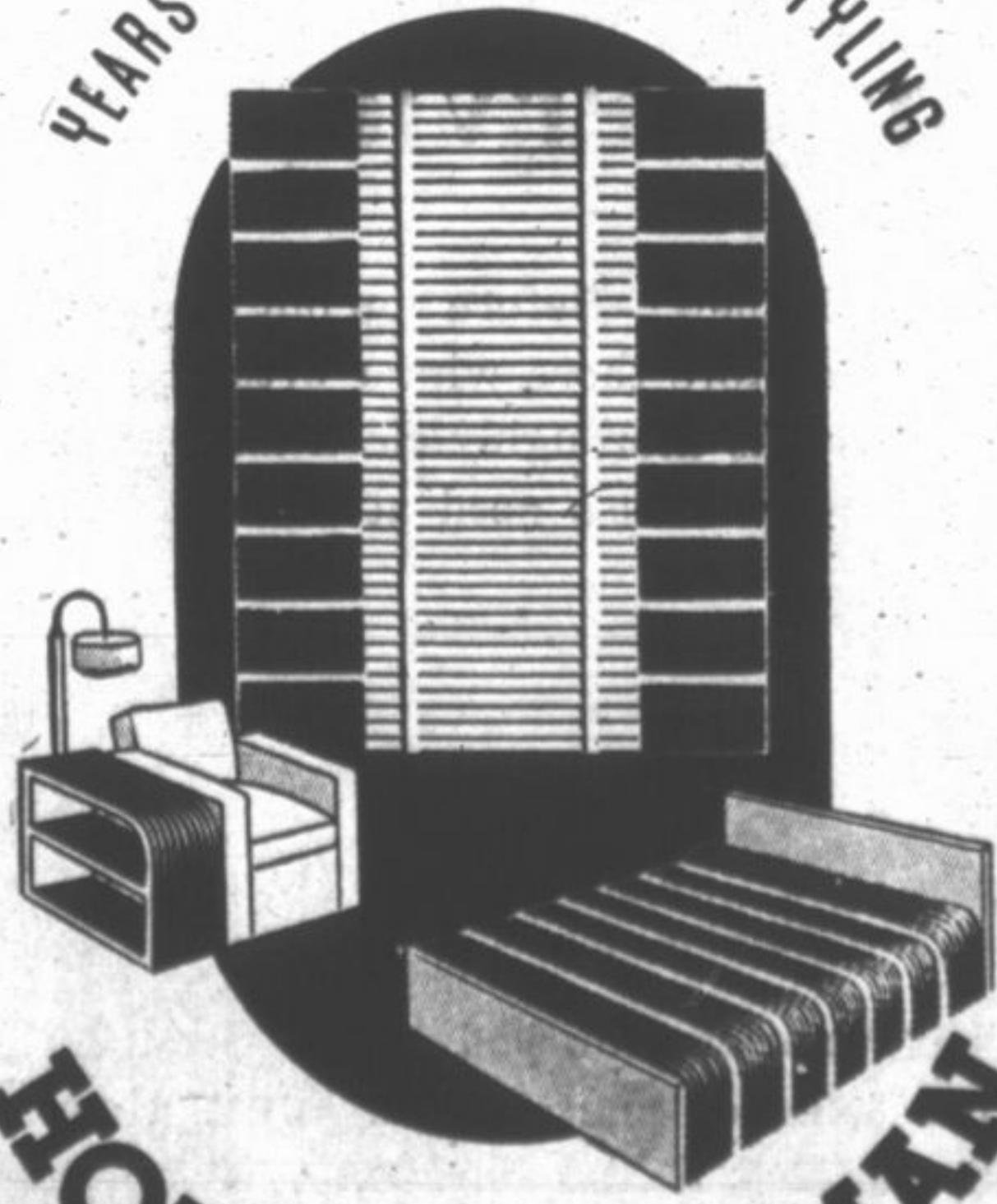
