#### Council 5th in Region

A regional bulletin just received giving the comparative membership of the councils in Region 7 of the Boy Scouts of America discloses the fact that the North Shore Area council is now the 5th largest council in Region 7.

The four councils which have a larger membership are Chicago, Detroit, Milwaukee and Indianapolis. Boy membership, Cub Scouts and Senior Scouts in the North Shore stands at 2590. Ten years ago when the council was organized there were only approximately 300 boys registered in but few troops. Now the membership is distributed in some 70 units in all of the towns from Wilmette on the South to Waukegan on the North and serving the west North Shore from Glenview to Antioch. Besides the 2900 boys recorded there are over 500 scouters giving leadership to the Cubbing and Scouting program.

#### Sectional First Aid Meet Held

The sectional first aid meet between the North Shore Area council, and the Evanston, Oak Park and Northwest Suburban councils was held last Friday evening at the Main Township high school in Des Plaines to pick the team which will represent this section in the semifinals at the Hotel LaSalle on Saturday April 3. The team which came out victorious in a close contest was that representing the Northwest Suburban council, Troop 3 of Niles Center. The contest consisted of four first aid problems which had to be diagnosed by the contestants each team member in turn acting as problem leader. After diagnosis and assignment of work to the scouts a limited time was given for the correct treatment of the cases. All of the teams scored better than 80 per cent correctness and showed good training. The team which represented the North Shore Area council was from Troop 59 of Libertyville. Mr. Walter Herr is the scoutmaster of the troop, Louis Faulkner, trainer of the team and Otto Moleador, Francis Carney, Jim Madden, Ted Vanderweff and Oscar Kalanka are the team members.

#### Jamboree Rates Reduced

Word was received last week from the Regional Scout office and from the railroads to the effect that the railroad rates to Washington for scouts attending the national jamboree have been reduced to 1c per mile. This is a saving of \$7.70 over the rates previously published and makes the transportation cost to Washington \$16.38 for the scouts going from the North Shore Area council. This is the news that all scouts and leaders have been waiting for, and it should mean that more scouts will be able to go from this territory.

#### Council Planning Camp-O-Ree

A Camp-O-Ree (an inter-patrol camping competition) is being planned for the troops of the North Shore Area council. The event is being planned for the first Saturday in June, June 5, running until about 2 o'clock on Sunday 6. ### MOTOR CLUB AUTO TEST EQUIPMENT HERE ON MARCH 29

In order to help students detect any weakness in their driving, the Chicago Motor Club is bringing out their test equipment to the Highland Park high school during the week starting March 29. The safety education classes, consisting of 66 students, will be given the first opportunity to take the test.

Mr. Moore and his staff, with the

aid of a number of vocational boys, will be in charge of the test. The test, which takes 45 minutes, brings out, for instance, any defects in eyesight that the student may possess.

The test also consists of speed estimation, activity, reaction time, strength of grip, hearing, blood pressure, excitability, drivometer, and hand-eye coordination.

About 400 students will be able to take the test during the week. Last year the tests were given to 212 of our students during the two days it was here.

Any student desiring to take the test may obtain a pass from Mr.

Belle or the office during his free period.

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
