

**Citizen's Ticket Endorsed by Many**

On next Tuesday, April 6th, the citizens of Deerfield township comprising the cities of Highland Park, Highwood and the southern limits of Lake Forest are urged to cast their vote for the fourteen offices to be filled at this election. Polls will be open from 8 a. m. to 5 p. m. and the polling places will be the same as the presidential election last November.

A formidable list of candidates is presented by the Citizens ticket composed mainly of present incumbents and three new candidates all of whom are well known in this community and are well qualified by education and experience to fulfill the duties of their offices. The Citizens ticket is composed as follows:

For Asst. Supervisor, Arthur H. Swanson; for Assessor, Harry Earhart; for Town Clerk, Albert Larson; for Town Collector, Gregory M. Sheahan; for Justice of the Peace (five to be elected), Clarence J. Shetzley, Samuel S. Smith, Richard B. Martin, Dorsey D. Hu-

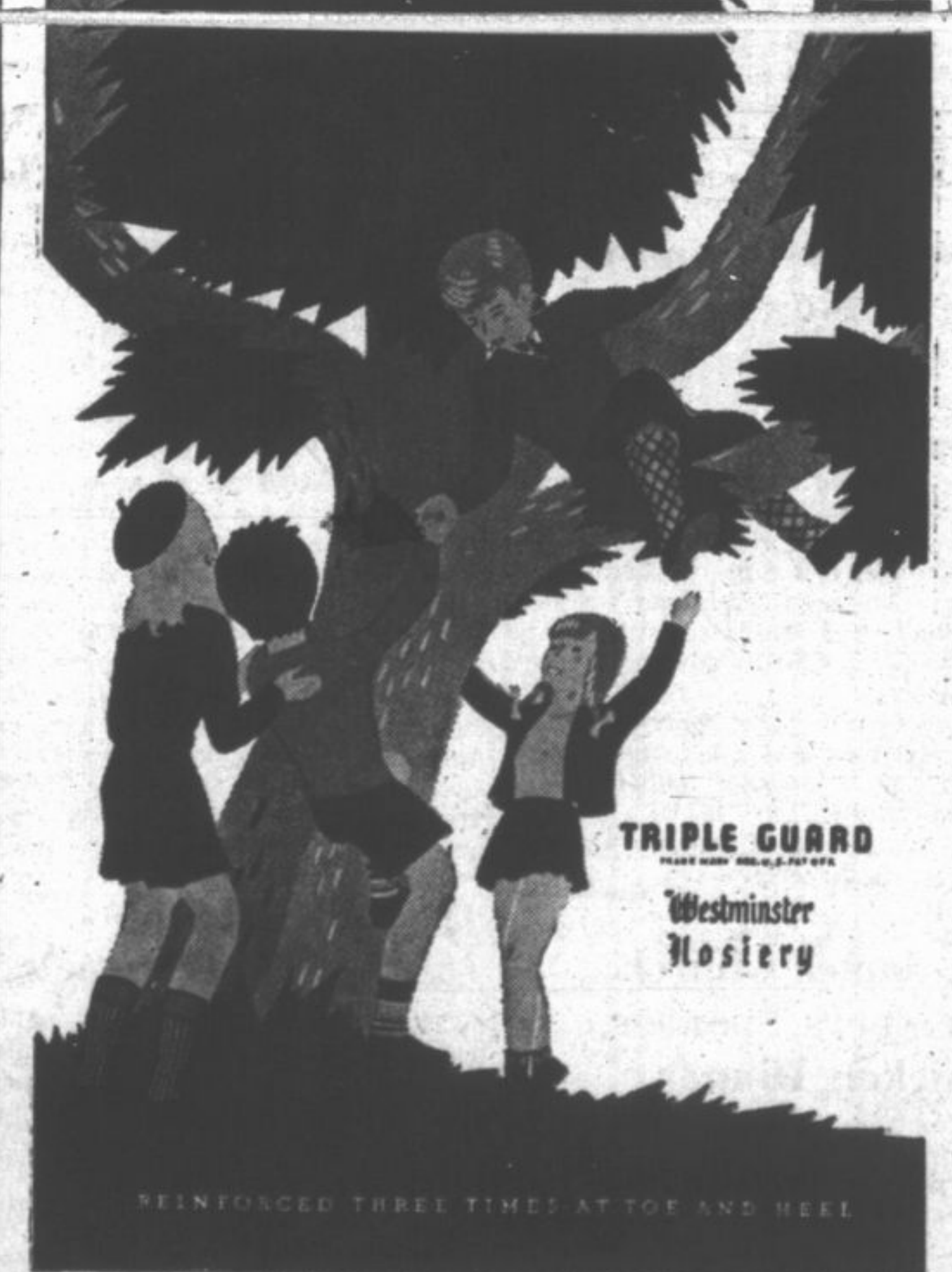
