Adult Council to Hear Discussion on Hospital Insurance

The last lecture in the series of Thursday evening lectures sponsored by the local Adult Education Council will be given in the English club room at the high school this evening (Thursday) at 8:15 o'clock. Mr. Perry Addelmann, executive secretary of the Hospital Insurance Corporation of Chicago, will speak on the subject "Hospital Insurance."

Mr. Addelmann, who is well qualified to discuss this very important movement, will explain how a family in the middle group income, in a group of families, upon the payment of a small sum can be assured of twenty-one days of free hospital care, in case of necessity, each year, and of the physicians' attention during that time.

In telling how the plan has worked, Mr. Addelmann told of one group, in which the youngest patient was 2 1/2 years old and the oldest 79, while ailments ranged from acute sore throat to a pathological gall bladder. The twenty-five patients spent a total of more than 200 days in the hospital, while their payments to the plan totaled only \$76.85, involving a saving of more than \$1200. Proving that the hospital attention and physicians' care was satisfactory, a number of testimonials from individuals praising the arrangement were received.

Upon payment of a small fee, any resident of this and the neighboring communities may hear Mr. Addelmann this evening at the high school when he discusses this important matter.

Walther League District Convention to Be Held April 10-11

The thirteenth annual district convention of the Walther League of Northern Illinois will be held in the grand ballroom of the Stevens hotel on Saturday and Sunday, April 10 and 11. The Walther League is the youth organization of the Evangelical Lutheran church and is an
