30 and July 9 is expected to attract some 25,000 scouts and leaders from all parts of the United States and from many foreign countries. The North Shore Area council is planning to send at least one full troop of thirty-three scouts and three leaders for this greatest of all Boy Scout encampments ever to be assembled in the United States.

The site of the jamboree is in Washington, D.C., along the Potomac river and many of the activities will take place on the Washington Monument grounds. The various scoutmasters of the council have detailed information concerning the cost and program and the equipment to be taken by each scout. The cost of the jamboree has been decreased from the amount originally published because of the new rate for transportation to which the railroad companies have agreed. A preliminary training camp for the north shore contingent will be held on the jamboree site in Washington for the three days preceding the start of the regular camp. The preliminary training as a troop is required of all contingents and the jamboree site was chosen for the north shore group.

**Kickapoo to Be Operated**

More complete information will be published in the folder which will be distributed soon to all scouts in the council through their troops.
