cluded in Mrs. Frank's fine report. Many improvements in house furnishing and upkeep under the direction of the house chairman, Mrs. Theodore Fischer, were featured in the house report read by Mrs. J. C. Ewell, showing 192 different girls had stayed at the Highland Park "Y" during the past year.

The report on clubs by Mrs. Corliss Anderson, sponsor of the Leadership Council, the planning group where representatives of all the clubs come together, covered the programs of the three business girls clubs, Pi Delta, Emanon League, and B Y's. The presidents of these three groups are Emily Marks, Janet Leonard, and Mae Hansen and all clubs are interested in the National-Wide banquet and peace programs which the National "Y" arranges. The progressive Mother's club with 85 active members whose president is Mrs. Einar Paulsen; the Friendship club with its many new members reported by Estel Buser, president who attended the "Y" convention in Colorado Springs; the "Y" Grade School clubs where 75 girls enjoy supervised recreation under the leadership of Ethel Gartley Skidmore, were all praised by Mrs. Anderson for their fine co-operation.

Mrs. Theodore Osborn as president of the Highland Park "Y" asked the secretary, Miss Mary Robe, to contrast the local association with those of other cities and Miss Robe particularly mentioned the friendliness and real concern each group felt for the other clubs. She spoke of a desire that mothers who bring their children for activities should not feel that they were merely coming to a building where people did all sorts of different things but that there was a real fellowship waiting for all to share. "We need the imagination of all our 200 members so that we may all go to the interesting places we want to go during the coming year," concluded Miss Robe. Mrs. Fritsch and Mrs. Oliver were appointed to invite those not members to join that evening.

Since Mrs. J. B. Garnett, treasurer, was in Florida, Corliss Anderson representing the mens advisory committee, gave a resume of the auditor's report. It showed that income and expense for the past year totalled approximately \$10,000 each; \$1,000 more income was received previous year and an extra \$1,600 was spent on upkeep and needed repairs.

Following the report of the chairman of the nominating committee, Mrs. Clifford Hawes, Mrs. Eugene Pfister, Mrs. Andrew Bradt, and Mrs. Paul Downing were unanimously elected to the board of directors and Mrs. Alfred Burdick, Mrs. Elmer Hecketsweiler, Mrs. Theodore Osborn, Mrs. L. F. Harza, Mrs. G. L. Canright, and Miss Adele Everett were re-elected. Four much appreciated vocal numbers were given by Mrs. W. C. Pohrte, Mrs. George Hinn, accompanied by Mrs. Hawley. Grace was said by Mrs. Carleton Mosely, a member of the Central Branch Chicago Service committee.

The speaker of the evening was Mrs. Arthur Hauser, of River Forest, a member of the Chicago board of directors, formerly assistant dean of girls at the University of Illinois. Mrs. Hauser spoke on "Why I Believe in the Y.W.C.A." and presented as her first reason her belief in its purpose.

To build a fellowship of women and girls devoted to the task of realizing in our common life those ideals of personal and social living to which we are committed by our faith as Christians.

In this endeavor we seek to understand Jesus, to share his love for all people and to grow in the knowledge and love of God.

As her second reason Mrs. Hauser gave the universality of its fellowship, including women and girls of all creeds and nationalities working together for the good of all. The democratic principle of planning programs and the fact that these programs are based on the real need of local groups were her third and fourth reasons, while under her fifth reason Mrs. Hauser gave a history of the changes within the association policies during the last twenty-five years as proof of its flexibility. That the Highland Park "Y" is part of a world-wide organization covering fifty countries with 446,000 members in the United States was stressed by Mrs. Hauser as she asked all to help carry the spirit of fellowship. With the singing of "Follow the Gleam" the 26th annual meeting was closed.
